AYDLETT FRIENDS SAY ELEVEN COUNTIES HIS

Ahoskie, May 31.—Friends and supporters of E. F. Aydlett, of Elizabeth City, say he will be the leading candidate for the Democratic nomination for Congress in the First District when the ballots are counted Saturday night, June 7. Furthermore, they say he will carry every one of the 14 counties in the district except the three counties in which his opponents live.

"Confidently, Mr. Aydlett expects to get two votes from Beaufort County for every one vote Mr. Warren gets from Pasquotank," is the word that comes from his workers this week. They say further, "Mr. Aydlett's friends have not been boasting—they have never believed in trying to fool any one, and have therefore waited until they could sound out the people and pretty clearly ascertain how matters stand." Listing Tyrrell, Currituck, Camden, Perquimans and Pasquotank as 90 per cent for Aydlett, the claim is made that in Gates he will get 80 per cent of the votes, and 75 per cent in Dare. In Martin, they say, Mr. Aydlett will get a good majority; and Pitt will be found in his column from 50 to 60 per cent strong.

The selection of Burton, long time friend of the President, is understood to have been virtually agreed upon by William Butler in charge of the Coolidge campaign and his associates.



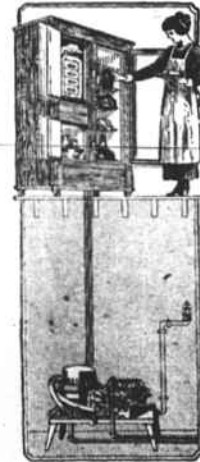
