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McLEAN NOMINATED GOVERNOR

Indications Beat Bailey By Crushing Majority

McLean Forces Claim Their Candidate's Majority Will Run Up To Between 50,000 And 65,000 And On Early Returns McLean Leading Two To One

Raleigh, June 7.—A victory for Angus Wilton McLean of from 50,000 to 65,000 votes in his race with Josiah William Bailey for the gubernatorial nomination of the Democratic primary was predicted at his headquarters at midnight, on the basis of reports from campaign managers.

On incomplete returns from counties from every portion of the State the Lumberton man is leading the Raleigh lawyer by more than two to one.

J. Elmer Long of Durham is leading Bowley by a slight margin for Lieutenant Governor, while Reynolds is running a good third.

W. A. Graham who was appointed by Governor Morrison to be Commissioner of Labor and Printing after the death of his father several months ago, on the basis of incomplete returns was leading Latham of Belhaven and Parker of Raleigh in 137 precincts. Graham's vote was 4,062, Latham 3749, and Parker 1769.

For Commissioner of Labor and Printing Grist of Lenoir was leading Shipman, incumbent, Peterson of Clinton, and Nash. With 112 precincts heard from the vote was: Grist 4121, Shipman 3486, Nash 1178 and Peterson 968.

Stacey Wade, present Insurance Commissioner, was far ahead of J. P. Flowers of Charlotte for that office with 8567 votes to Flowers 1812 in 124 precincts.

For Corporation Commissioner George Pell had 5657 votes in 124 precincts to 5201 for Oscar B. Carpenter.

Mecklinburg Opens for McLean
 Charlotte, June 7.—Clear Creek number one rural, the first precinct in Mecklinburg County to report, gave Bailey 8, McLean 107.

Saluda for McLean
 Columbia, N. C., June 7.—Saluda, Polk County went 14 for Bailey, 149 for McLean.

West for McLean
 Raleigh, June 7.—The first 10 precincts reporting for Governor in the Democratic primary for North Carolina today gave Angus Wilton McLean of Lumberton, former chairman of the War Finance Corporation, 384 votes to 58 for J. W. Bailey of Raleigh. All ten precincts were from the western part of the State.

ATTEMPT TO DEBAUD BANKS IS THWARTED
 Buffalo, June 7.—A wholesale attempt to defraud Buffalo banks was nipped in the bud when James Calhoun Collins, long sought alleged forger, was arrested today by postal inspectors and Detectives.

Collins who has a half dozen aliases, had planned to cash bad checks at nine local banks today. The inspector said that the grip containing the checks was found in his room.

United States Attorney Henney announced that Collins had confessed to passing bad checks for more than \$100,000. He is charged with using the mails to defraud.

WOMAN DELEGATE HONORED
 Cleveland, June 7.—Mrs. Elizabeth Martin, delegate at large from Pennsylvania, was selected as chair of the committee of permanent organization of the Republican National Convention today. This will be the first time a woman has held the chairmanship of a National Convention committee.

Small Speaks for A. W. McLean at Weeksville
 Weeksville, June 7.—Characterizing Angus W. McLean as "one of the noblest men who ever ran for office in North Carolina," Walter L. Small delivered a forceful address here Friday night favoring the Robeson County candidate.

Mr. Small stated that he knew both of the candidates for Governor personally and that while he thought J. W. Bailey a "fine fellow" he pointed to his record as too inconsistent for a man who seeks the Governorship of North Carolina.

Mr. Small's address was followed by a brief talk by E. F. Aydtlett, candidate for Congress, who stated that he had not come to make a speech but merely wished to assure the voters here that he believed that "from all evidence that I can gather, that I will be nominated for your next Congressman." The remark brought forth the most pronounced applause of the evening.

Storm Visits Richmond
 Richmond, June 7.—A storm of cyclonic proportions struck the city late last night, demolishing buildings, uprooting trees, and doing considerable damage in the city. The full extent of this damage is not yet known.

ALBEMARLE COTTON IS EXTREMELY LATE

Reports from various parts of the Albemarle district indicate that the cotton crop has been delayed by the late summer and frequent cool nights. This condition makes it especially advisable that frequent shallow cultivation be practiced according to cotton men.

N. T. Aydtlett who made a visit to lower Currituck County this week reports that cotton in that section is more backward than he has ever seen it.

Frequent cultivation allows air to reach the roots of growing plants and warms up the soil inspiring the young cotton to exert itself more.

County Agent Falls recommends that cotton be chopped out that a good heavy stand is left in the field. Too drastic measures in chopping out cotton prove injurious, he says. The width of a hoe blade should be the maximum width as experiments have proven that close spacing is better under weevil conditions.

While cotton has been hampered by the cold weather it seems to have had less influence on corn. Crops in Pasquotank County are in fine shape, especially those patches in the vicinity of Weeksville.

CRAIG CRITICALLY ILL

Asheville, June 7.—Former Governor Craig is in a serious condition and is not expected to live.

Carmine Wins Out Over All Of His Competitors

And Joe Spence Overwhelmingly Defeats George W. Brothers in Race for Register of Deeds.

Running much stronger than was expected, Charles Carmine is leading by a majority of practically 100 votes for sheriff of Pasquotank County and his nomination is nearly assured inasmuch as the unheard from precinct will not poll a large vote. Carmine received 1,136 votes, while Anderson received 346, Ball 155, Ferebee 362, Hobbs 164.

From returns filed up to midnight Saturday, J. T. Spence is leading the present incumbent, Geo. W. Brothers, for register of deeds of Pasquotank County. Spence received 1,549 votes against 437 for Brothers. Spence showed strength in all the precincts.

In the race for the State Senate P. H. Williams of Elizabeth City is leading the ticket, with J. H. McMullan of Edenton running a close second. With just a few precincts in this county missing, it appears that Costen will be the third man.

"Chicken Corner" was the scene of one of the liveliest political meetings of the campaign Thursday night when something like 300 voters of the Second Ward turned out to hear J. C. B. Ehringhaus speak for Angus Wilton McLean.

While they had such a good crowd to talk to other candidates mounted the platform and made a final plea for votes including E. F. Aydtlett, candidate for Congress, and Miles W. Ferebee, J. Walton Hobbs, and Louis Anderson, candidates for sheriff. Carmine was called for, but was not present, so Ben Emmitt spoke in his behalf.

CHAUTAUQUA TENT CREW HERE

The Chautauqua tent crew has arrived in the city and the erection of the big Chautauqua tent for the seven joyous days of June 12 to 18 will be begun at once.

It is hoped that the erection of the tent will bring home to the folks that Chautauqua is at hand and the time for buying season tickets getting shorter every hour.

Walter J. Millard, who will act as Superintendent at the Elizabeth City Chautauqua this year, when he is not engaged in such work, is doing the interesting job of advising cities and counties how to make the tax payer's dollar give more service.

Mr. Millard has conducted campaigns in over twenty cities for better city charters, most of which apply to the city manager plan. The largest of these cities is Cleveland, Ohio. Last winter Mr. Millard was one of the three principal men who conducted a three day institute on local government and its problems in Columbia, S. C., at which all the Congressmen and Senators, the governor and his staff, and the bulk of the state legislators were in attendance. He is also regarded as the foremost spokesman for proportional representation.

Mr. Millard will make these questions the subject of his lecture on the second day of Chautauqua in Elizabeth City. During his stay in the City Mr. Millard will be glad to confer with any who are interested in solving of the great problem of more service at less cost that all cities, especially the smaller ones, are now facing.

TEMPLEMAN TO PREACH BACCALAUREATE SERMON

Weeksville, June 7.—Dr. S. H. Templeman will deliver the baccalaureate address for the Weeksville High School here Sunday afternoon at 4:15. Rev. Vance Havner, pastor at Salem and Rev. W. T. Phipps, pastor of Newbegun and Union church will also participate in the services Sunday afternoon.

An operetta "Down Among the Fairies" will be presented Tuesday evening at 8:15 by the pupils of the first, second and third grades.

On Wednesday evening the fourth and fifth grades will render a Cantata "Midsummer Eve."

On Thursday night the declamation and recitation contest will be held and the Commencement sermon will be delivered by Dr. Robert H. Wright, president of East Carolina college at Greenville.

The Weeksville High School will be an accredited High School another year. Biology Home Economics and Agriculture will probably be added to the high school courses offered.

There are six pupils this year in the junior class and next year it is believed that at least that number will graduate.

Aydlett Loses To Warren In The Race For Congress

Elizabeth City Man Made Good Showing on North Side Albemarle Sound But Beaufort and Pitt, Solid for Warren, Sweep Washington Man to Victory

With just a few counties heard from on the south side of the sound, Lindsay Warren of Washington is leading E. F. Aydtlett of Elizabeth City by a comfortable majority.

While Aydtlett made a strong run in the adjacent counties to Pasquotank, Warren's strength on the south of Albemarle Sound seems to indicate that he will be the next representative for the First District in the sixty-ninth Congress.

Aydtlett received a majority for Congress in Pasquotank of about 1,000 votes, while in Pitt County, five of 14 precincts gave Warren 1,373 against 169 for Aydtlett. Five precincts out of six in Hertford County gave Warren 355, Aydtlett 94.

MUCH WOOL SOLD

Kerrville, Texas, June 7.—(Special).—Over 1,700,000 pounds of spring wool has been sold this week to Adams and Leland, Hollowell Jones and MacDonald, and Winslow & Company of Boston. Prices ranged from 45 to 47 1/2 for 12 months fleeces and 40 to 42 for 8 months clips. Another half million pounds will be offered shortly.

RALEIGH PHYSICIAN IN TROUBLE AGAIN

Fayetteville, June 7.—Following a telephone call from Federal Narcotic Agent J. W. McDonald in Raleigh to the police of this city, a woman given her name as Mrs. Evelyn Barlow was taken from a Raleigh bus on the edge of town and arrested on a charge of selling narcotics.

Carried to the police station she was found to have in her possession 40 grains of morphine concealed in powder boxes.

It is alleged by the Raleigh officers that the woman has been buying narcotics from a Dr. T. F. Jones of that city, who was arrested last October on a charge of violation of the Federal narcotic law and released on a bond of \$1,000. The police, it is said, allege that Dr. Jones has been selling narcotics and shipping it to other peddlers such as Mrs. Barlow. One of the police it is said saw the woman buy narcotics from the doctor on last Saturday and she was traced from place to place in the city. Several days later she attempted to leave the city and the Federal officers phoned Fayetteville officers to arrest her.

Mrs. Barlow is now being held pending the arrival of Federal officers. Both Dr. Jones and Mrs. Barlow will probably be given a hearing immediately upon her return to Raleigh.

DEAD IN EXPLOSION TO TOTAL FOURTEEN

Wilkesbarre, June 7.—Eleven are known dead and several others are believed dead and injured as a result of mine explosion near here late yesterday.

Mine officials expressed the opinion this morning that the number dead would reach 14. Three are now reported missing and two are in the hospital seriously injured.

POSTAL SALARY BILL VETOED BY PRESIDENT

Washington, June 7.—Veto of the postal salary bill was decided upon today by President Coolidge, who will return it to the Senate in which it originated before final adjournment tonight, with a message declaring it would impose an unwarranted drain on the public treasury.
