

Perils Of Presidency Are Not All Political

Bodily Dangers and Plenty of Them Attended Candidates During the Final Strenuous Days of the Campaign for the Nation's High Offices

New York, Nov. 5.—The perils of the Presidential trail are not all political. In these strenuous days of campaigning there are bodily dangers and plenty of them attending the search for high office.

Governor Charles Bryan's narrow escape from death or serious injury when his automobile was smashed into by a car travelling in the opposite direction and on the wrong side of the road, made it almost unanimous for the present campaign.

John W. Davis, Democratic candidate for President, also had a close call in an automobile smash-up. Young Colonel Theodore Roosevelt, running for governor of New York state, got tangled up in an automobile jam but the only damage done was knocking a traffic cop off his motorcycle. The cop was trying to guard the colonel and the colonel's car plunged into him. Young "Ted" quickly hopped out of the machine, saying "You're all right, old man, aren't you?" And the old man said he was.

General Dawes has not been as active as was anticipated, but has been on the go enough to get into several tight places on his automobile journeys. Governor Al Smith, dashing about state and city, has had a way cleared for him as far as possible, but he, too, has been sideswiped once or twice in situations which held a high element of danger.

In 1920 Governor Cox, running for the Presidency, was train-wrecked out in the Arizona desert. Several members of his party also had narrow escapes outside Columbus, Ohio, when their car skidded on a wet pavement going some 45 miles an hour and ended up on a railroad track in front of an on-coming train which was flagged just in time to prevent disaster.

The late Colonel Roosevelt was shot in the chest during his Bull Moose campaign for the Presidency in 1912, but managed to complete his tour and seemingly suffered no after effects from the attempted assassination. Colonel Roosevelt had several exciting experiences and narrow squeaks while he was President, one of his secret guards being killed in one accident.

Senators LaFollette and Wheeler appear to have had about the "safest conduct" during the campaign which now is history, with the exception of President Coolidge who remained in Washington and confined his campaign "irregularities" to an occasional stroll down F Street through the shopping district. In this he exemplified once more his policy of being "safe, sane and conservative."

The dangers to which candidates are subjected merely emphasize anew the jeopards which accompany extensive automobile travelling in these days of crowded thoroughfares and reckless drivers. The difficulty is that the drivers of the candidates themselves become reckless. There appears to be an irresistible impulse to speed the moment a prominent public character steps into a motor car. Every distinguished visitor to New York, who is given a police escort, gets the ride of his life and some have had to complain of the breakneck pace at which they have been toiled from point to point about the metropolis. Where candidates like young Colonel Roosevelt have been scheduled to appear at eight or ten different meetings the same night it has been necessary to drive them across town and from one borough to another at speeds of

40 to 50 miles an hour, regardless of traffic conditions.

President Harding loved to speed. He was driven through Maryland once at 54 miles an hour. This was a great tribute to the state's highway system, but it drew a protest from some of the motorists who thought such high Presidential speed was making the roadways anything but safe for the Democracy. When Mr. Taft was President he was driven around the Grand Prize automobile cup course at Savannah, Georgia, at 60 miles an hour and did not blink an eye.

The high speeds at which Presidents and Presidential candidates are driven not only imperil the lives of these principals, but in the past have brought death and injury to members of their parties. Within a period of less than four years three newspaper men were killed while on Presidential assignments and half a dozen others were seriously hurt.

Some concerted effort to slow up campaigns and also the Presidential pace after election must be taken in due course of time.
