BUSINESS OPENS UP ITS THROTTLE ANOTHER NOTCH

Volume Wholesale Orders and Shipments Encouraging But Retail Trade Lagging on Account Weather

AUTO INDUSTRY BOOMS

Employment Records Broken as Buick Reaches New Levels and Others Step Up Schedules

For the fifth consecutive week, all previous records for industrial employment in the Elizabeth City area of the automobile industry, were broken. The total employed reached 27,894, a gain of 6,000 since January 1.

The definite improvement in the steel business is reflecting these increases to some extent. Higher steel prices are anticipated by J. E. Kulis, president of the Otis Steel Company and James A. Campbell of the Yorkston Sheet and Tube Company.

The effects of the anthracite strike are beginning to bear down on both operators and miners. The cost of keeping the mines in operation is a heavy burden and many are expected to close.

Lumber demand, production and shipments fell off from last week but new business was larger than at this time last year. Enquiry for copper has let down and prices for the metal weakened slightly.

4 Basis of Dispute Between 1 Coolidge and Ship Board Now Revealed In Detail

Publication of Correspondence Between President and Chairman O'Connor Makes Clear Origin and Crux of Controversy as to Relation of the Board to the Fleet Corporation and Its President

Washington, Oct. 7.—Hitherto unpublished correspondence between President Coolidge and Chairman O'Connor of the United States Shipping Board is disclosed today, revealing that the President entered into understandings with prospective appointees whereby they were to agree to carry out certain policies.

Members of the board now have voted not to carry out the President's program because they say it is a violation of law and contrary to a provision of the Constitution which vests in Congress alone the power to dispose of public property.

The President's letter is dated June 25 last and is in answer to a lengthy explanation from Chairman O'Connor telling him why the board could not give Admiral Palmer the power desired by the Chief Executive.

BOY WINS MEDAL BY HEROIC DEED

George R. Little, Jr., Rescued Companion from Drowning at Resort

Presentation of a silver medal awarded by the Treasury Department to George R. Little, Jr., young son of Mr. and Mrs. G. R. Little of this city, for heroism in rescuing his boy companion from drowning at Chatham on May 16 last, was the main event yesterday afternoon at the Fair Grounds.
