

WOMEN'S INTERESTS

Children Of School Age Are Often Undernourished

Sale of Christmas Seals Conducted to Make These Little Ones Over Again Into Strong, Healthy Boys and Girls, and Men and Women

O. Max Gardner of Shelby, State sale chairman for the North Carolina Tuberculosis Association, makes the following statement:

"The production of healthy, strong men and women is the first and most important consideration of our people. Without them all other production and all other things cease to have value. With an ever increasing number of them our wealth and everything that has value increase and keep on increasing. One thing that is interfering largely with the production of these much desired healthy, robust men and women is the undernourished child."

"One cannot grow any kind of good plant or animal unless the young is properly nourished during the growing and seed bearing or fruit bearing period. This is much more important in the life of the child than in any other animal or plant, because the product of the growing child—the man or woman—is more important."

"And yet I am reliably informed that from ten per cent to fifty per cent, averaging, perhaps, around 30 per cent of the children of school age in our state are undernourished. In figures this is somewhere around 300,000."

Among many other things, the North Carolina Tuberculosis Association, with the aid and advice of the National Tuberculosis Association, is addressing itself actively and effectively to this important subject and to these 300,000 children. Both the National and State Associations are financed by the sale of Tuberculosis Christmas Seals. These seals are being sold in every state and in every city, village, and hamlet and the total sale is expected to reach five million dollars this Thanksgiving to Christmas. The quota for North Carolina is \$90,000.

"I commend this work to the people of our state. Let every letter and package that we send out from now until Christmas carry this Christmas Seal and join with the great wave of seals that is sweeping over our fair country at this Christmas time, bringing relief and cheer to the tubercular, and prevention of this and other diseases to the 300,000 undernourished children of our state and like percentage in other states."
