

Elizabeth City Wins By Onslaught in Eleventh

SCORE IS TIED IN NINTH FRAME

Coming From Behind, Local Team Stages Tremendous Rally to Defeat Hertford, 4 to 3

Epitaph with a desperate energy born of the knowledge that the pennant was about to slip from their hands, the Elizabeth City baseball nine delivered handsomely yesterday, defeating Hertford 4 to 3 in the eleventh inning of a game that long will remain a classic among followers on the diamond here. It was essentially a pitchers' battle between Stanley Johnson, who shares honors with Engleman as one of Hertford's better mainstays, and Joanne Jones, former Virginia League star, who had been brought from Norfolk to stop the slugging Perquimans outfit.

Elizabeth City climbed from behind to tie the score in the last half of the ninth when Doss, Hertford's crack pitcher in Norfolk, was safe on Lindley's error, on which he advanced to second, and took third and home on sacrifices by Leitman and Hippie, respectively. Hippie, former manager of the team, also had been brought from Norfolk to help break Hertford's winning streak.

Lindley goes to pieces. After having played errorless ball until the ninth, and after having faultlessly handled six chances, many of them decidedly difficult, Lindley appeared to go to pieces. He made a second error in the tenth, which nearly cost Hertford the game then and there; and it was his misaim in the eleventh that put Doss again on base and finally turned the tide when, with the sacks full, Kibler hit safely along the third base line.

Hertford got off to a flying start in the first inning. Carson, lead-off man, was given a free pass to first—the only walk issued by Jones in the game—and Andrews was safe on a fielder's choice in which Carson was retired at second. Carroll annexed an infield hit, and Johnson walked. Kibler, on a two-bagger to left, Leitman misjudged the fly, and advanced on it when he should have been retreating a mile a minute; but it is problematical whether he could have gotten it, anyway. It was a tremendously hard hit ball. Not an Elizabeth City hitter reached first until the fourth. With Hertford hitting on all six,

The situation began to look desperate. Then, unexpectedly enough, Johnson walked. Kibler was out on a grounder, advancing Kibler to second, and Saffelle brought him in on a smashing double to deep left. There was no further scoring in that frame.

Hertford added another run in the fifth inning, when Underwood singled and scored on Carson's sacrifice fly, and thenceforth the visitor were able to annex only goose eggs, although the situation became decidedly uncomfortable.

in the eleventh, when Andrews hit a two-bagger with one out and nobody on. Carroll and Johnson were retired in succession, however, and the menace vanished.

When the Rally Began
The score remained 1-3 in Hertford's favor until the eighth. Pitcher Jones hit safely, Kibler did the same, and Saffelle walked, filling the bases with one out.

Jones scored on Smith's sacrifice, and Wallace fanned, retiring the side. Then, as related already, the tide was turned by scoring in the ninth and eleventh while Hertford was held tight.

Today's game will be played in Hertford, beginning at 4:30 o'clock and Elizabeth City has every hope of winning and tying the series. This hope is built mainly around Mayo, stadium moundman of the Air Station team, who has won 14 games this season, without a single defeat.

At present, the count in the championship event is three for Hertford and two for Elizabeth City, the pennant to go to the winner of the best four out of seven.

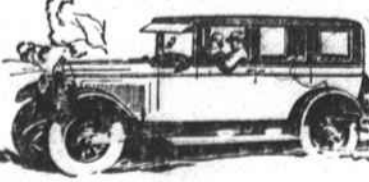
