

Atmosphere Geneva Is Most Friendly

Geneva, Switzerland, July 13.—(AP)—The delegates to the Tripartite Naval Conference today decided to convene a plenary session tomorrow at 3 p.m.

Tomorrow's plenary session was arranged, it was learned, in order that assurance can be given that the negotiations are continuing in the friendliest manner.

The atmosphere at Geneva today was most friendly. Although a meeting which was held today did not result in any agreement on the census problem, the Japanese insisted that they must have real limitation.

Today's meeting was at the home of H. E. Butler, assistant director of the international labor bureau in order to take up the problems confronting the conference. Their chief interest centered on the question of cruisers and Japan's announced intention to sign no treaty which invites the expansion of the Japanese navy.

FUNERAL CONDUCTED DR. T. W. O'KELLEY

Raleigh, July 13.—(AP)—Funeral services were held here today from the First Baptist Church for the Rev. Thomas W. O'Kelly, D. D., who died after a long illness last evening.

Dr. O'Kelly, widely known Southern Baptist minister, former professor at Morehead University, Georgia, which presidency he declined, was laid to rest with honors. His body lay in state before the bier, as hundreds filed by in mute testimony of his service to humanity.

Columbus, July 13.—(AP)—Possibility of request for a special term of Superior Court to try Harrison Pritchard, 35, for murder, was today being talked by local Columbus citizens, following the slaying of Pritchard's tenant and uncle, John Turner, 56, prominent farmer, who was buried yesterday. Pritchard was held in Columbus, alleged assailant of Turner, in a row, which had no eye witnesses on a farm in a remote section of the county. Pritchard was arrested by officers, who said a quantity of liquor was found in his home.


