

COMMERCIAL.

REMARKS ON MARKET.

The water courses are yet very low and consequently but little produce can be brought above tide way.

TURPENTINE.—Since Saturday last some 500 barrels of Turpentine were disposed of at \$2.25 per barrel for Yellow Dip and \$2.50 per bbl. for Virgin Dip.

ROSIN.—90 bbls. No. 1 Rosin changed hands at \$1.37 1/2 per barrel.

SPRITS TURPENTINE.—We hear of no sales since Saturday except a few barrels which was taken at 28 cts. per gallon, it is very dull, 26 cts. offered, but not accepted, that we hear of.

TAR.—None in market that we are apprised of.

TRINEX.—One raft was sold at \$8 per M., and one, a mixed raft, at \$8.50 a \$12 per M.

SHINGLES.—None in market that we hear of.

CORN.—Cargo of Schrs. Ann Elizabeth was this week at 68 cts. per bushel, cash.

BACON.—Supply fair at present, ham getting scarce.

FLOUR.—A fair supply at present of Northern Flour.

HAY.—50 bales prime Eastern Hay were sold at 85 cts. per 100 lbs., and a lot of inferior Northern Hay, was sold at 70 cts. per 100 lbs.

FRESH BEER.—There were one or two good beeves in market yesterday, and some very indifferent; the supply at present is but small.

CUCUMBERS.—Scarce, and much wanted.

FRESH BUTTER.—Is very much wanted; good Country Butter, is selling from 20 to 25 cts. per pound. For other articles see Table.

NEW YORK MARKET.

For three days preceding.

May 31. Cotton.—The sales for the week are 7500 bales at 7 1/4 to 11 1/4.

Flour.—Southern has been in fair demand for the West Indies and home use, but the market closes dull, with some decline in prices; the sales are 3000 bbls. at \$4.43 1/2 to \$4.62 1/2 for common to good brands.

Corn.—Has been in good supply and fair demand, and the market closes a little lower, the sales are 125,000 bushels, closing at 56 1/2 to 27 1/2 cts. for best, 57 1/2 to 58 1/2 for mixed, Western, and 59 for Northern round and Western and Southern that Yellow; White continues scarce and wanted.

Naval Stores.—We notice sales of 3000 bbls. North Carolina Turpentine, embracing all here) at \$3 per 280 lbs; 1700 North Carolina and Wilmington Common Rosin, \$1.39 a \$1.49 delivered; 200 strained Rosin, \$1.40 in yard; 1000 White, \$2.75 a \$4 per 280 lbs; 150 North Carolina Tar, \$1.87 1/2; 350 Spirits Turpentine, 34 a 34 1/2 cents (that at the lower rate said not to be in good order, 4 a 50) do. 35 part for export, and in retail lots 36 a 37, all cash—the stock on hand is small, and part of that here is held for higher prices.

Rice.—The market continues heavy, the demand being quite limited, both for home use and export. The sales of the week amount to about 500 tons at \$2.75 a \$2.60 cash.

PHILADELPHIA MARKET.

May 31. Cotton.—The week's sales have been limited to some 4 a 500 bales, taken in small lots within the range of 9 1/2 cts. for Uplands, and 9 1/4 to 11 1/4 cts. for Mobile and New Orleans, on the usual credit.

Flour.—The home trade has operated to small extent at \$4.25 a \$4.37 1/2 for common and good retailing brands, \$4.44 a \$4.75 for extra, and \$5 a \$6 per bbl. for fancy brands.

Corn.—No change, and 35 a 40,000 bushels sold, including Penna and Southern yellow, at 60 cents.

Naval Stores.—We are only advised of sales of about 250 bbls. Spirits Turpentine, mostly within the range of 38 a 38 cts. per gallon, cash and time, and 100 bbls. Tar at \$1.75 per bbl. 4 mos.

Rags.—About 150 bales strictly sold at 54 cts. per lb. on time.

Rice.—Is stationary, with moderate sales to the trade, at 84 a 84 cts. per lb.

BOSTON MARKET.

May 30. Cotton.—The market for the past week has been very quiet, the sales not exceeding 800 a 1000 bales and confined to the retail trade at 9 a 12 cts.

Flour.—Sales comprise Alexandria, \$4.62 1/2; Genesee common, \$4.62 a \$4.75; do extra, \$4.6 a \$5.25 per bbl; Michigan, \$4.37 a \$4.62 do do.

Grain.—The sales of corn have been mostly in lots to the trade at 62 a 63 cts. for yellow flat, 60 1/2 cts. for half mixed, and 60 cts. per bushel for white. Oats, best kind, 48 cts. per bushel. Rye, northern, none. Shorts, 40 cts. per double bushel. Rice.—Sales 150 casks in lots to the trade 34 a 34 cts. per lb.

Naval Stores.—The transactions in spirits Turpentine comprise 200 a 300 bbls. at 38 a 39 cts. per gallon, cash, and demand at the close more limited. Rosin—Common shipping in good supply with recent large receipts—Sales at quotations. Tar—Several hundred bbls. North Carolina and Wilmington 1.87 a .82 per bbl. Pitch moderate—sales southern at \$1.75 per bbl. 6 mos.
