It appears, as we stated last evening, that the Mexican Congress did not adjourn on the 20th ult. both Houses having agreed to prolong the session for two days.

The principal question before the Chembers was that of granting extraordinary powers to the President. The Scoate last passed a resolution giving the Government the privilege of disposing of the remainder of the American indemnity to the public creditors, and sillowing longs to be negotiated to the amount of \$200,000 per month; of suppressing the maritime and frontier custom houses, and of doing various other things suited to the exigencies of the times. The Trait d'Union says of these resolutions, that they are all a mystillation. They give with one tand and take away with the other, and would be of no practical utility for the raising of funds.
