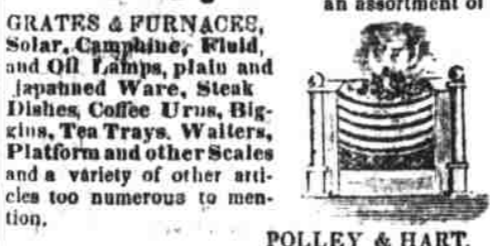

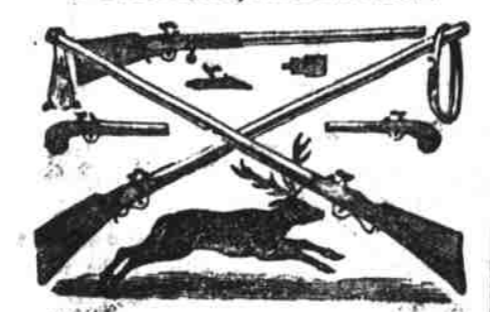

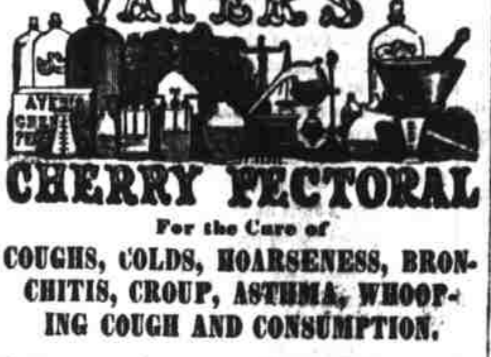

A VOLCANIC ISLAND.

It will be remembered that an island, about 120 feet high and 2,000 feet in circumference, suddenly sprang up in 1851 between Sicily and La Pastellaria. It disappeared about a month after, and at a latter period even the sounding lead could give no indication of its existence; but vessels passing over the place it had formerly occupied would sometimes feel a sort of shock, which showed that it was of volcanic origin. In March last, however, the French vessel Eole, which was taking soundings in the vicinity, discovered some traces of its existence; and we now learn from Naples that in the course of last month Her Majesty's ship Scourge, Captain Kerr, verified the truth of the preceding observation, and further discovered that the island, which has been christened "Isola Ginia," was only nine feet under water.—*Journal des Debats.*

A SINGULAR ASSASSIN.

Late English papers recount the recent confession of a murderer which has hardly a parallel in the annals of crime. The man Lynch, little and weak, but always deemed respectable and religious, began his murderous career in Ireland, by cutting down with an axe a driver in the highway, whose dray and bullock he coveted. Soon after, he overtook an old and young man, and killed them both in order to obtain possession of their horse and cart. With these he hastened to a distant part of the country, and stopping at a lonely farm, managed to kill all the occupants, consisting of an old man and his wife, a boy and a little girl. He took possession of the farm, and by his ingenuity and hypocrisy escaped suspicion, and came to be deemed almost exemplary character. One of his laborers at last began to mistrust him, but was soon silenced with cold steel. The last murder led to Lynch's detection and conviction. Here were eight persons deliberately butchered, one after the other, all for the sake of a little bit of property, that was hardly worth a twelve month's wage. This, in itself, is a sufficiently strong phenomenon of moral perversion—but, as it is to make it the more extraordinary, Lynch habitually wore the semblance of piety. He prayed often, stirred up the consciences of his victims before dispatching them and showed himself anxious that they should not go out of the world with their sins.

FEMALE LYNCHERS.

A correspondent of the Ottawa (Ill.) Constitutional relates the following:
On the 17th ult., in Livingston County, in this State, a man by the name of James Dickson, near, was arrested on a warrant issued by a justice of the peace, charged with having whipped and cruelly treated a girl about eight years of age, who was living with him; and during his absence from home, and when in attendance before the justice, some fifteen or twenty women of the neighborhood assembled and sent some of their party to the house of Dickson, who succeeded in decoying his daughter, (a young woman of about 20 years of age) who was also accused of ill-treating the child, a short distance from the house, where they were joined by the remainder of their party. They then commenced whipping the young lady in a brutal manner, and, after dragging her a considerable distance from the house, and over the fence, and not yet satisfied with their inhumanity, nor their hearts softened by her prayers and tears, applied a coat of tar and feathers, and after loading her with stones, set her at liberty. At the time Miss Dickson was taken from the house, none of her friends were present except her mother, who was confined to her bed by sickness, and some small children.

GROWERS.

There is a class of men in every community who go about with vinegar faces, because they are not appreciated as they should be, and who have a constant quarrel with their destiny. These men, usually have made a very grave mistake in the estimate of their abilities, or an unmitigated error. In either case they are unfortunate. Wherever this fault-finding with one's position or condition occurs, there is always a want of self-respect. If people despise you, do not tell it all over town. If you are smart, show it. Do something, and keep doing. If you are a right down clever fellow, wash the worm-wood off your face, and show your good by your good deeds. Then if they feel above you, "go straight off and feel below them." If they turn up their noses because you are a mechanic, or a farmer, or a shop boy, turn yours up a notch higher. If they swell when they pass you in the street, swell yourself; and if that does not fetch them, conclude very good naturedly that they are unworthy of your acquaintance, and pity them for missing such a capital chance of getting into good society.

Society never estimates a man what he imagines himself to be. He must show himself possessed of self respect, independence, energy to will and to do, and a good sound heart. These qualities and possession will "put him through." We are tolerably humble, in our way, but we do feel above such folks, and respect
