Can a country prosper under such a wretched perversion of the blessings designed to be secured by a free press? Are we forever to be the sport of demagogues and selfish aspirants, who know no other motive of action but their advancement and glory? Is it not worth some sacrifice on the part of every lover of truth and the welfare of the republic, that the press should be regenerated? Many will answer in the affirmative, but they almost despair of seeing it accomplished. We are aware of the difficulties that interpose in conducting an independent journal. The displeasure of patrons is constantly held up in *terram* over the editor's pen. The laconic phrase, "Stop my paper," from a subscriber has a magic influence in stopping an editor's ink. For ourselves, we can with propriety declare that we never told a wholesale truth in our columns, which did not cost us six dollars. But nevertheless, the work is practicable, though like all great reforms, it will require time for its accomplishment, and the sustaining influence of the patriotic and disinterested. - Norfolk Argus.
