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FOR THE COMMERCIAL. VINDICATION.

Mr. Eorron: In replying to the unprovoked and unchristian personal attack of Mr. James Casidey, I shall confine myself, for the present, to the evidence which he has adduced, to establish his charges against me. I deem it necessary to say but a few words in regard to his quibbling in not having mentioned me by name, as I consider it an entirely unbecoming member of the christian church. It is well known that some of those charges have been made against me heretofore in private, by some of the members of the South Carolina party; that I have denied, and authorized my friends to deny them; that I have requested to meet my accusers face to face, and that the facts upon which the false statements are based are of such a nature that they cannot be applied to any one else; and that Mr. Casidey has acknowledged they were intended for me. And yet he opens his last attack by a well feigned surprise that I should have denied these charges, while he and others knew that all my efforts for weeks to convince him of his wrong were based upon a denial of them.

I was not aware until now that he was entirely dependent upon the testimony of the Rev. Mr. Crook, and as he has failed to perceive it, I shall now proceed to show that his testimony will not answer his purpose. And here let it be remembered, that his failure, even in attempting to sustain by evidence any of his charges, except those connected with the name of Mr. Crook, is a tacit acknowledgment that they are false.

In reply to the first inquiry of Mr. Casidey "when you invited him to preach?" The Rev. Mr. Crook states it was "at the time he together with his family spent the evening with us at the parsonage," which was on the 12th or 13th of March. I would state that there were then three or more persons besides myself, who can testify that he did not then invite me. And the circumstances connected with their testimony are of such a character as almost to demonstrate the absolute impossibility of his having done so. I visited Wilmington strongly prepossessed in favor of the Rev. Mr. Crook, from the friendship which had existed between him and my father-in-law's family, and so expressed myself to Bro. D. Sanders, who had apprehensions that I would not meet with a cordial reception, owing to the state of feeling which had been manifested towards the ministers of the N. C. Conference. My father-in-law, the Rev. Samuel Lander, who is favorably known to the ministers of the S. C. Conference, accompanied myself and family to the parsonage on the evening alluded to by the Rev. Mr. Crook. I had informed him of the apprehensions of some of the brethren, and he was thus prepared to notice the manner of my reception, and particularly the conversation between the Rev. Mr. Crook and myself. During that evening the Rev. Mr. Mahoney invited me to preach in Wilmington, and suggested an exchange of labor between the Rev. Mr. Brown and myself, and Bro. B. expressed a willingness to do so. I made some remark showing that I appreciated their courtesy, but at the same time I felt that they were not authorized to invite me, and especially so, as when it was done the Rev. Mr. Crook, by his silence, and by changing the conversation, studiously avoided sanctioning the invitation. The course of Mr. Crook was observed by my father-in-law, and immediately upon leaving the parsonage, was the subject of conversation, and afterwards of a confidential correspondence between us. I have inquired of him recently as to his recollection of it, and in a letter dated August 11th, he states: "I recollect taking tea with you at Bro. Crook's, but I do not recollect that Bro. C. asked you to preach, directly or indirectly, and if you remember, after we left there on our way to the hotel, you remarked something like the following: 'there is a sample of ministerial courtesy for you - did you take notice how your great friend Crook treated me this evening, never asked me to preach for him at any time, but seemed to keep that subject altogether out of sight.' I recollect very well saying to you, although I was pained and mortified at that part of his conduct myself - that Bro. Crook would do right and to let you kindly or I should be very much disappointed in the man. And I know on my way home, I thought of it frequently, and was grieved to think that a man I held in such high estimation should treat any of my family, and especially a Methodist minister in that way." The Rev. Mr. C. gives only one other time in which he believes he invited me, but as he is not certain as to the day, week, or month, but merely "thinks" it was "in the Fourth Page."

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
