Nor can there aught my heart estrange,

James Fennimore Cooper, Esq., died at Cooperstown, Otsego county, N. Y., on Sunday last. The event was not unexpected, but will not be less regretted. Mr. Cooper has contributed largely to the amusement of readers wherever the English language is spoken and no American has done more to advance the literary reputation of his country. Mr. Cooper was born in Burlington county, N. J., on the 15th September, 1789. He was 62 years old, lacking a day, at the period of his death. The foundation of his lame as a novelist was faid by the production of his Spy, which was followed up speedily by the Pioneer, and the at Leather Stocking" tales and his sea novels. He produced thirty-four novels, besides a Naval History, Travels, &c. A writer in the international Magazing, in reviswing Gooper's works, says: works, says:

There was not a language in Europe in which all his novels, after the publication of the Red Rover," did not appear almost as soon as they were printed in London. He has been the chosen companion of the prince and the peasant, on the borders of the Volga, the Danube, and the Guadalquiver, by the Indus and the Ganges, the Paraguay and the Amazon, where the name even of Washington was never spoken, and our country is known only as the home of Cooper. The world has living no other writer where in me is so universal. whose same is so universal. We may add that among the early admirers of Cooper a a novelist was the late Colonel Trumbull the historical painter whom we have heard express his preference for Cooper's novels even over those of Sir Walter Scott."

It is stated by the Albany (N. Y.) Register that, on an analysis of the green and red coloring matter of Candy, they are found to be composed of deadly poisons; the former is made up of arrentic of potass, and the latter generally of lend and mercury. Several cases among children, which have resulted nearly in death, have recently occured in that city from eating green and red candess. The green is the poisonous, and one of the largest hearts colored in that way, on an analyzation, was found to contain enough arsenite of potash to kill a child.
