HINTS ON NAVAL DISCIPLINE

HIN1S ON NAVAL DISCIPLINE
Demogracy is the Navy.

For many years past certain pseudo reformers have undertaken to abuse the publication of government which prevail is the navy service. The idea has been altempted to be inculcated that the officers are exacting and tymnoisch, and that Jack is beaten and banged about in a manner derogatory te his manhood, violative of his rights, and outrageous on humanity. It has been gravely proposed to abofish the existing regulations, disband the personnel of the navy, and substitute the elective system, as more conformable to our republican institutions and the liberal democratic feelings of the people.—The necessity of such at unovation has been carnestly urged in a certain journal poblished in the city of New York, as the ground that the despotic authority exercised on ship-board was inconsistent with the natural rights of men, and absolutely intolerable. All this wretched stuff passed unheaded, for it was inconceivable that such a proposition could be entertained for one moment by any one outside of an asylum for idiots. The thing was so absurd, and its demograciem so flagrant that it was deemed in possible for any impression to be made in any intelligent quarter by an army of such hypocrites, even when pretending to act from philanthropic motives. No man of ordinary understanding requires to be told that not only the efficiency of an armed vessel, but the safety of all on board, depends upon the manntenance of unquestioned and absolute authority on the part of the commander.—Any innovation upon it is subversive of ocder and destructive of the usefulness of the vessel. Republicanism and equality some charmingly and work practically very well on dry land, but they are inadmissible on ship-board. Carry out the theory of these reformers, by introduing the republican principle, and you would have the captain inviting all hands on deck that he might take their opinion on the propriety of pucking the inevitable consequences. And yet the abolition of corporal punishment in the n vorite arm of the national defence. We the frighte Raritan, now in the South Pacific ocean, as we find it described is an exchange, furnishes additional evidence on this

point.
