

NEW YORK MARKET.

Jan. 10. Cotton.—There has been an active demand for the past three days, which has been met on the part of the holders, and as some lists have been sold to arrive at lower prices, we have reduced our quotations on some kinds of a cent per lb. We quote at 7 1/2.

Floor.—The sales are 400 bbls. of \$4.43 1/2 for common to good brands Alexandria, Baltimore, Brandywine and Georgetown, and \$4.75 a 5 2/5 for fancy brands.

Grain.—There is a steady fair demand for Corn, and the market, with moderate supplies, continues very uniform—there is no inquiry for export, except for White, which is very scarce; the sales are 30,000 bushels, at 65 cents for mixed Western, 66 for Northern round Yellow, both in store, and 68 for Jersey do. delivered.

Naval Stores.—Turpentine and Rosin continue steady at previous prices—the stock of the former is about 2000 bbls. North County, and that of the latter, is considerably reduced. We note sales of 1600 bbls. North County Turpentine at \$3.00 per 280 lb., 1700 Wilmington Common Rosin, \$1.21 a \$1.25; 700 North County do. \$1.24 a \$1.26, delivered; 1100 No. 1. \$2 a \$2.87 per 280 lb.; 160 No. 2. \$1.50 in yard; 300 Tar, \$1.75; 350 do. selected, in lots, \$1.87 a \$2; 1200 Spirits Turpentine, \$4 a 3 1/2 cents cash, wholesale, and 36 a 30 1/2, retail, the market closing with an upward tendency.

Rice.—The demand has been active, with an advance on the better descriptions only, of about 1 1/2 cents per 100 lb. and the sales of all descriptions during the week amount to about 1700 tonnes, part to arrive, at \$2.62 a \$3.62. The stock is light.

PHILADELPHIA MARKET.

Jan. 9. Cotton.—There is rather more firmness in the market under the late foreign news, but the stock being considerably increased by the recent arrivals, buyers are not very anxious to take hold at the present high rates; good Cottons, however, are scarce, and wanted. The week's sales reach some 750 a 800 bales, within the range of 8 1/2 a 9 1/2 for Uplands, and 10 a 10 1/2 for New Orleans, cash and time.

Floor.—The sales for home use have generally been within the range of \$4.25 a \$4.74 for fair mixed and choice brands, \$4.50 a \$5 for extra, and \$5.25 a 6.25 per bbl. for fancy brands.

Corn is in demand at a further advance, and the market is nearly bare. Sales of new Southern and Pennsylvania yellow have been made to arrive at 60 a 65c; and 3000 a 4000 bushels old have also been sold at 65c, in store.

Naval Stores.—There is rather more doing in Spirits, but at a slight decline and about 400 bbls. sold in lots at 38 a 38c per gallon, cash and time. In other articles there is no change, and we are only advised of sales of 3 a 400 bbls. Soap Rosin at \$1.50 a 2.50 per bbl.

Rice is rather scarce, with small sales, part for export, at 3 1/2 cts. per lb.

GREAT WHEAT AND CORN STATES.

A correspondent of the Pittsburg Gazette, writing from Washington, says:—From the abstracts of statistical returns already prepared at the Census Office, it appears that Pennsylvania in 1850, was the largest wheat producing State of the Union. I have had the curiosity to compare the six most prominent States in respect to this crop, and give them below, with the crop of each as shown by the return:

Table with 2 columns: State and Bushels. Pennsylvania 15,482,191; Ohio 14,907,056; Virginia 14,516,996; New York 13,073,000; Michigan 4,918,000; Maryland 4,494,680.

In the yield of Indiana corn, Ohio bears off the palm, or rather she stands prima inter pares magnas, for five States stand almost in a line in regard to this important staple.

These States and their respective crops are as follows:
