There are foam-embroider'd ocean's; There are little wood-clad hills. There are little inch-high saplings, There are cedars on the hills. But God, who counts by souls, not stations, Loves and prospers you and me; For to Him all vain distinctions Are as pebbles in the sea.

Toiling hands alone are builders Of a nation's wealth and fame; Titled laziness is pension'd, Fed and fattened on the same. By the sweat of other's forehead, Living only to rejoice, While the poor man's outraged freedom Vainly fifteth up its voice.

But truth and justice are eternal, Born with lovelessness and light, And sunset's wrong shall never prosper, While there is a sunny right; And God, whose world-beard voice is singing Boundless love to you and me, Will sink oppression with its titles, As the pebbles in the sea.

IRISHMEN ABROAD. "Send the Irishman to Australia, to the States, or to any English colony, where he can make himself; by industry, a proprietor of land, and where he is not shackled by middle-age legislation, and he becomes immediately the most energetic and conservative of colonists. He there acquires faster than any one else; he effects more in a day than any one else; and he forces his rulers to write over to England--as the governor of South Australia did a few years ago--that the Irish are the most enterprising, successful and orderly of all the colonists of those distant lands. In every colony of our empire, and among the motley multitudes of the United States, the Irish are distinguished by their energy, their industry, and their success. They are industrious and successful everywhere but in Ireland."

Why is this? why is the Irishman thus pale-stricken and torpor-bound in the land of his birth? What cause has doomed one-third of that beautiful land to sterility, and fifteen hundred thousand of her children to a sentence of starvation or banishment. In the very ten years during which the rest of the modern world has been making the most unexampled advances in prosperity and population?

The cause of cause, we reply unhesitatingly, is to be found in the unparalleled and monstrous system of land-ownership and land occupancy, which has for ages prevailed and still prevails in Ireland.

The Irishman in Ireland is still "shackled by middle-age legislation," he cannot "make himself by industry a proprietor of land." Here lies the true secret of the whole matter. Since the first introduction of Norman Feudalism, by Stroughbow, five separate confiscations--under Philip and Mary, under Elizabeth, under James I--under Cromwell--under William III--have had the effect of wresting the land of Ireland from the Irish and accumulating it in enormous masses in the hands of the conquering and colonizing race.
