ARRIVAL OF THE STEAMER FRANKLIN. 4 DAYS LATER FROM EUROPE. The British Parliament—Heavy Failure—The English Government Prosecuting the Irish Press—Fears of a French Invasion Affairs in France—Napoleon and the Swiss Government—A Great Movement Expected in Paris—From India—The Queen of Spain, &c., &c.

FRANKLIN arrived this morning, from Havana and Cowa, having left the latter place on the morning of the 15th ult. On the 24th, in lat. 49 41, long. 35, she was by a Cuban steamer, bound East. The Franklin brings 55 passengers and a valuable cargo of French goods, with \$190,000 in specie.

The Arctic arrived at 10 o'clock on the 17th, having made the passage in 9 days and 18 1/2 hours, being the shortest trip on record. The America arrived at Liverpool on the 15th, at 4 P. M.

The ship Antarete, of New York, put back to Liverpool on the 17th, having struck on Blackwater Bank, and being obliged to throw overboard a large portion of her cargo. The ship Western World, of Mobile, arrived at Havre on the 17th ult.

ENGLAND. The bill of incident in parliament was the introduction by Lord John Russell of a bill to organize the local militia. They are to be selected by ballot in their respective counties and not to be sent out of their counties except to repel invasion.

A bill to disfranchise the borough of St. Albans had been brought into Parliament, and also a bill to abolish religious tests in the Scottish Universities. The motion of censure on the Irish government, is fixed for Thursday, and is looked forward to with much anxiety by the ministers. The failure of Mackay & Co., whose liabilities are £200,000, is announced.

The excitement regarding the gold diggings in Australia had greatly increased. The yield of the miners is immense. The English Government had commenced prosecuting the Irish press. The proprietors of the Dundalk Democrat had been arrested for a libel upon the Government.

The fear of a French invasion still prevailed, and was by no means limited to the English Channel. In the English Channel, the Tanguis has been reported to have been in the channel, consisting of 15 ships of the line, 10 frigates, and 15 or 20 steam frigates. The town of Lassau, on the West coast of Africa, had been almost totally destroyed by the British squadron, on December 26th.

The English sustained severe loss, having 30 men killed and 66 wounded. A fair proportion of the engineers and mechanics of Manchester had gone to work, and only one establishment was entirely closed. In the House of Commons on the 17th, Lord Clanricarde presented himself to be sworn, but he declined taking the oath of supremacy, claiming though a Protestant the right to take the form prescribed for Catholics. Objection being made the noble Lord left the House.

FRANCE. France was perfectly tranquil. The approaching elections were the absorbing topic of conversation, and excited great interest. It is still affirmed that Napoleon has designs upon Belgium. He has also made demands upon the Swiss Government for the suppression of the clubs and the banishment of refugees. The Swiss Government has refused to accede, and claimed the intervention of Great Britain.

The correspondent of the London Daily News states that some great movement may be expected in Paris on the 23d of February, and orders have been issued to the various Generals to be prepared for the emergency. Trade in Paris was in a very depressed state, and discontent was spreading. Prices of grain had fallen.

INDIA. The overland mail reached London on the 16th. The commercial advices by the overland mail were considered more satisfactory than for several months. Accounts from Bombay state that the Bernese Government had yielded to the demands of the English. Doubt were, however, entertained of the King's sincerity, 100,000 troops having been mustered and warlike preparations made. The British fleet still remained off Ragoon. In Canton, the rich men had been called on to contribute large sums towards the expenses of the war, reports concerning which were exceedingly vague. Col. Outram had been superseded as consul at Baroda. A great fire occurred at Hong Kong on Dec. 28, which destroyed 500 houses. The Kuangs rebellion was making great headway. Tea had declined at Canton. Cotton was firm.

SPAIN. The Queen of Spain was rapidly recovering from her wound, and the excitement in relation to it had in a great measure subsided. The recent attempt to murder the Queen had excited an enthusiasm in her favor before unknown. Recruiting for the army was taking place all over the country, and artillery were being mounted on the forts.

AUSTRIA, ETC. In Austria, Belgium, Italy, and the other continental countries, active preparations were in progress to meet every contingency that may arise.
