

PHILADELPHIA MARKET.
March 20. Cotton.—To-day's sales have been more doing, and the market closes firmly at last week's rates; sales in all reaches some 3,300 bales at 8 1/2 a 9 1/2 for Uplands, and 9 1/2 a 10 1/2 for New Orleans, on the usual terms.
Corn has improved, and the receipts some 25 a 25,000 bushels, mostly Southern yellow have been taken at 60 a 61c, including some today at 61c and white, a few days' crop, at 61c. Oats are in request, and 6 a 7000 bushels sold at 3 1/2 for Delaware and 3 1/2 for Penna.
Naval Stores.—There is rather more doing.—Some small lots Spirit Turpentine have been disposed of at 40 a 42c per gallon and 1600 lbs. soap Resin at \$1.50 a 1.75 per bbl. Tar and Pitch, no sales.
Rice is more active, and 3 a 400 casks have changed hands, part for export at \$3.75 a 3.84 the 100 lbs.

BALTIMORE MARKET.
March 20. Cotton.—Sales for the past week amount to 708 bales, embracing middling to fair Virginia, Georgia, and Gulf, at 8 1/2 to 9 1/2 cts. The demand has been rather better, owing to the favorable advices from England, though the sales here made show no advance in prices.
Flour.—Thursday market declined with sales of 500 bbls at \$4.12; and to day continued dull, with sales 700 bbls at same price, closing rather heavy.
Corn.—During the present week Corn has gradually improved, closing to-day, at 57 a 58 for yellow, and 56 a 57 cts for white, and for a very superior lot of 800 bushels 55 cts paid.

SAN FRANCISCO MARKET.
We have received the San Francisco Price Current of the 17th February.
There was a decline in Flour from \$11 to 9 1/2; Coffee 10 a 10 1/2; Sugar, Brown 6 1/2 a 7; Bacon Hams 14 a 15; Eggs per Bbl. 6 a 7; Bricks 80 a 85 per M.; Lime, \$4.50 a 5; Rice, 7 1/2 a 8 cts per M.
Some articles of provisions are very high, while others would hardly pay the cost and transportation.
The Shipping List says:
"The principal feature as distinguishing this year's trade from that of the past season, seems to be that importations, to judge by actual receipts and advices, will be much lighter and better suited to our wants; and from this may reasonably be inferred; more regular, legitimate and remunerative business to all concerned, than has heretofore marked the course of business in San Francisco. The flurry of speculation in paper, color, and the over-trading recklessness that marked the conduct of California undertakings, has subsided; permanent and abiding interests have taken the place of hasty projects and enterprises for enormous but uncertain gains; and we must regard the general result as highly beneficial to our commercial community, and fairly indicative of our steady certain progress."

During the month of January, there were no shipments of Dust to any other ports than the above ports, and no shipments of Coin.

THE TRADE OF THE UNITED STATES.
By the official statement the value of articles exported from the United States last year amounted to \$517,517,130, of which there were domestic products to the value of \$178,516,555; domestic gold and silver, \$18,143,163; foreign gold and silver, \$11,085,717; foreign goods exported, \$9,738,805—making an aggregate, as above, of \$217,517,130.
The imports in the same period amounted to \$245,725,995, of which \$1,987,001 were in specie. If we deduct the specie from the gross amount of imports, there also, the \$9,738,806 for foreign goods exported, there will remain \$201,019,399 as the value of foreign goods imported into and consumed in the country in the year 1851, against \$178,516,555 of domestic products which we exported in that year—leaving a balance against us of \$22,472,844. This is bad enough, yet it would have been a great deal worse, but for the advance in the price of raw cotton, which thus swelled the value of our exports, and reduced the balance against us. This, and the gold received from California, enabled us to meet the cost of our importations, and but for these resources, the one incidental and the other new, how would the industrial and commercial interests of the country have sustained themselves in the crisis which they have to pass through at the close of the year!
And yet, in view of these facts, that we are neglecting or refusing all protection or encouragement to our own industry and contributing all our resources to the support of that of foreign countries, Congress is idling its time away, and thinks of nothing and will do nothing by a proper alteration of the tariff, to remedy this evil.
