Mr. Editor.—It has not been forgotten in this community how Dr. John Bellinger, according to his own voluntary and published history of the affair, did in his place in the City Council declare to his brother aldermen that "after a patient, lengthy, and somewhat learned examination" of the subject, he felt himself "able to explain and vindicate" the doctrines of his Church; and how, moreover, he then and there charged on the "Chief Reformer of the Protestants" that he "blatantly immoral practices, the sanction for which is extent in his own writings."

Inasmuch, however, Mr. Editor, as you admitted Dr. Bellinger's article into your columns, offensive, as it was calculated to be, to all your Protestant readers, we claim of you the insertion of Mr. Gildersleeve's second letter which we herewith communicate.

MANY PROTESTANTS.

Dr. John Bellinger, Charleston, S. C. DEAR SIR:—While awaiting your reply to our note last week, in which we respectfully requested you either to retract or to verify your charge against an honored name, we will take the liberty of making a few comments upon your "endeavor to separate the Catholic from the Alderman."

For the more general understanding of the allusion, it may be sufficient to remark that Leachy, the Ex-Monk of La Trappe, on his recent visit to Charleston, had given public notice that at a given time and place, he would make awful disclosures in relation to the principles and practices of the Roman Catholic communion—and that none but men were to be admitted to the Lectures which he should deliver—that the Proprietors of the hotel in which he resided to Lecture knowing, as they must have known, that a Catholic mob had been the frequent accompaniment of Leachy's Lectures in other cities, and wishing to guard their own premises against a like result, applied to the Mayor of the City to know if the corporation would be responsible for any damages to the property in case Mr. Leachy were allowed to Lecture in their hotel—and that the Mayor very properly laid the application before the council, giving the parties, even Leachy himself, the privilege of being heard in the case.

As an Alderman of the city you had a seat in the council, and participated in the deliberations of the body; and as your religious profession was well known, you gave notice early in the speech as reported by yourself, that you would endeavor to separate the Catholic from the Alderman! You intended to do it no doubt—and let the Alderman appear altogether unbiased by his views as a Catholic. But it seems evident to us that the Alderman and the Catholic were inseparably blended together. Nor is it at all strange that it should be so. The Aldermen who preceded you, in their capacity before the Council, and who advanced the principle of allowing "no separation of speech," gave utterance to similar sentiments and feelings as Protestants. You on the contrary gave full utterance to feelings and sentiments as Catholics.

When you asked the Council what necessity there was for these Lectures, and what results whether for good or evil, may be anticipated in case they be delivered? Upon the abstract question of the necessity of the Lectures you may be right. As Protestants we want "nece tati accitio, nec defensoribus solis." But in what capacity, Sir, did you argue the question? As the Alderman, or as the Catholic? Not as the Alderman, because the city authorities had no control over the freedom of speech, "had not the power to restrain any Lecturer from addressing the public, save only in case of apprehended insurrection." Such was the interpretation of the law, in which you as Alderman concurred. What then had you to do as Alderman with the question of necessity, or the probable good or evil that would result from the delivery of the Lectures? But you proceeded with the argument precisely as you would have done, if you had been invested with the power of restraining the Lecturer.—You told of the liberty which Leachy had enjoyed on the previous Sabbath of preaching in three of the churches of the city without let or hindrance from any one; but all this and much more you said, showed not the Alderman, but the Catholic. The Alderman had nothing to do with it. But to the Catholic it was a subject of deep interest, and he evinced what he would have done, if he could. Why, Sir, you must have seen that page.
