Correspondence of the Ballimore Clipper. Numerics-Jails for Women-Should be Abolished or Regularly Inspected. The fact that nunneries are built like jails.

with iron grates, bars and bolts, surrounded. with walls to exclude the inmates from sight of the world, is presumptive, evidence that hey are not always willing to remain .-When an opportunity offers, running all the risk incident to such an attempt, some of them do try to escape, which indicates that they are not so comfortable within as is pretended. When any of them do escape, the priests make most desperate efforts to force them back against their will, and if they do not eed. every effort is made to destroy their meter by the circulation of all manner of dal, and the sacrifice of the victim seems to be most desirable, if by so doing the indoor proceedings of the priests may be kept secret.

No class of men who were conscious of doing what is right, would bear the suspicion which is attached to the nunneries of this community, without desiring an investiga-tion which would clear up doubts.

It is a noted fact that nunneries, in Roman Catholic countries, have been as abominable as the lowest class of brothel houses, and the habitation of tyranny and oppression.-Complaints have been made of one in this city, and creditable witnesses testify to what should have called for an investigation and exposition of the facts, unless there was criminality in the case.

The unnatural state of things in this institution, bears on the face evidence of wrong. Unmarried pricats deprive unmarried women of their liberty and civil rights, making them abject slaves in soul and body to the priest-hood, bind them under vows, the refractory or unsubmissive in prisons under bars, bolts. and high walls, where with impunity the priests may perpetrate outrages upon them. The history of every escaped Nun is an apen declaration of oppression, and most E. P. Haff, Esq., Pres't Branch State) generally of such outrageous licentiousness on the part of the priests who visit the convent, that a black veil, or a green veil, or a white veil, cannot possibly cover up the abomination.

Such institutions belong to the despotic tyraney and licentionsness of the inquisition. nd are as directly opposed to the spirit of American liberty and the right of American citizens as are the cannon laws of the papa cy to the laws of the United States.

It is very evident that no individual should become an inmate of our city or country juil without the interposition of law. A public record must be made. It is certainly more necessary that such a record be made of those that become inmates of the jails which the printers have built for women, and not permitted to enter but through the courts. At present a young servant girl may go to confession to her priest. he may give her n note to the lady superior of the convent. on delivering it the lady may shew her into n room, the door of which being closed upon
