CALIFORNIA INTELLIGENCE.

ARRIVAL OF STEAMER ILLINOIS, FROM ASPINWALL.

The steamer Illinois, Lieut. H. J. Hartman, U. S. N., commanding, left Aspinwall on the evening of the 2d inst., and arrived at New York on Saturday afternoon. She brings the California mails of August 16th, \$653,937 in gold dust on freight, and 407 passengers.

Steamer Philadelphia, due at Aspinwall from New Orleans, had not arrived when the Illinois left.

The first meeting was celebrated by the citizens of New Grenada, in honor of the adoption of a new constitution, which was to go into effect on that day, and by which many important changes are made in the administration of public affairs.

The health of the isthmus is good, and much less rain fell in the month of August than is usually experienced during that portion of the wet season.

There have been no late arrivals at Aspinwall, (with the exception of the schooner "Petrel," of Baltimore, which arrived on the 1st inst.) although several vessels are now "over the sea." One "Baltica" from New York, had been out since Friday days, and fears are entertained of her safety.

September 6th, Hugh Young, aged 37, a laborer on the Panama Railroad, died of chronic diarrhoea, and was buried at sea.

Mrs. Catharine Sinclair, the actress, was tendered a complimentary benefit by the entire force of San Francisco.

The San Francisco dates are to 4 P. M. of August 10th. We set out from the files as follows:

SUMMARY OF NEWS.

From the San Francisco Atlas of the 15th.

Since the departure of the steamer of 1st inst., the ordinary elements of popular excitement have been quiescent. As the day of the general election approaches, the public mind with common consent turns to the question involved, to the exclusion of others. There is a greater degree of interest felt in the result of the pending contest than was ever before manifested on a similar occasion in California. The administration and the opposition parties are ardently canvassing the State from one end to the other, and both seeking to excite the popular passion.

As far as the accounts have been rendered, the public printing during the fiscal year ending June 1, 1853, amounts to the sum of \$218,547, more than half the officially estimated revenue of the State, and nearly equal to the amount which, according to the last annual report of the Comptroller, should cover the entire expenses of the government per annum. There are various printing accounts not yet rendered, amounting to \$10,000, which will raise the aggregate sum to something between \$230,000 and \$300,000 for the fiscal year.

The far-famed rubber chieftain Joaquin was captured and beheaded a few weeks since, and his head, preserved in spirits is now on public exhibition by his capturers. The public interest will be somewhat modified by the information that this wonderful head was taken from the shoulders of some Indian robber, and that the real hero of so many romances, the voracious Joaquin, is quietly enjoying the fruits of his adventures, at his native home in Mexico.

It has been supposed—and the question are now pending before the San Francisco Council—to establish a City Hospital, and to negotiate a loan of \$100,000 for the erection of public school houses. Both projects are favorably received by the public as wise and economical measures.

There have been a number of strikes among the laborers and mechanics. The dry laborers are generally getting \$6, and the mechanics from 3 to 5.

A spring, capable of furnishing fifty thousand gallons of excellent water daily, has been encountered in a tunnel of the Mountain Lake Water Company. It is thought that within six months the company will be able to furnish 3,000,000 of gallons of water daily in the city.

Gen. O. Hinton, a distinguished politician of Ohio, who was charged with robbing the mail in that State in 1849, has been arrested at Los Angeles and committed to await a requisition.

A fire on the 4th instant destroyed a large cracker bakery and several other buildings, on Chesnut near Powell street. Loss about \$12,000.

From Yreka.—*Fight with the Indians*—We learn from the Mountain Herald, of the 20th ultimo, that the party that started from Yreka on the 20th ult., for the purpose of recovering stolen cattle by the Indians, overhauled the thieves in a large and beautiful valley, watered either by McClellan's or Pitt's river, about one hundred miles from Yreka. When the party first discovered the Indians they were trying the speed of their newly acquired property. The whites attacked them just at daylight, each man picking up an Indian with his rifle, and then picking them up promiscuously with their revolvers. About 25 were killed, only 5 of the band having escaped.

Joaquin's head in San Francisco.—Messrs. Black and Nuttal, of Harty Love's Rangers, arrived in the city from Stockton, bringing with them the head of this renowned bandit, whose countless deeds of blood have earned for him a name unparalleled in the history of crime. Even since his capture, rumors have come of his being in the Southern counties of this State, carrying on his usual system of wholesale butchery and robbery. But Messrs. Black and Nuttal bring with them affidavits and certificates from persons who knew him well, which leave no doubts of the identity of the horrid evidence of his death. As soon as a suitable place for the purpose can be procured, the head and the proof of its identity will be exhibited to the public. The present object of the Rangers is to obtain the rewards which have been offered all over the country for the capture and death of this dreadful villain.

The head bears the impress of his character in every feature and lineament. It is that of a man about the middle size, apparently between twenty and twenty-five years of age. The forehead is high, and well developed, the cheek bones elevated and prominent, and the mouth indicative at once of a manly spirit and firmness. The hair of a beautiful light brown with a golden tint, long and flowing; the nose high and straight, and the eyebrows, which meet in the middle, dark and heavy.
