COPPER PROSPECTS!

The unparalleled success which has attended the extraction of Copper ores from the Duwassa and several other mines situated on Ducktown-creek, Polk Co., Tennessee, has very naturally given rise to great excitement among the landowners in the adjoining counties of this State, as well as those of Georgia; and at the present time the "copper fever" is prevailing in Cherokee, Macon, Jackson and Haywood counties to an extent which would be alarming if the epidemic were a fatal one.

Through Mr. E. Faber we learn that the indications for copper are even more promising in these counties, than in the Eastern portion of the State; that richer ores, and much more extensive veins are to be found, while the facilities for mining, and smelting the ores on the spot, are singularly favorable.

Several veins, which, although differing in character from those at Ducktown, are quite as rich and fully as well situated, have been traced for thirty, sixty, and even one hundred miles; and it is certain that in some parts they contain riches which will realize immense fortunes to the owners, if the proper course is pursued to obtain them; but such prospects, it must be understood, are a few and far between."

We know not what the future may bring; but if Mr. Faber's very moderate estimate should be realized, the western part of North Carolina is destined to be the richest mining district in the United States; and we sincerely hope that our citizens will proceed with energy to develop their prospects; and that if possible without the aid of speculators, who are sure to do the greatest injury to the country, while they fill their own pockets.

Since writing the above we have seen our friend, B. J. Smith, Esq., who has just returned from Yancey, and he informs us that the "copper fever" in Yancey, Watauga, and Ashe counties, is of a more malignant type than the yellow fever in New Orleans, and on the increase! He informs us that a vein (?) has been discovered in the vicinity of Burnsville--so he has been informed.

THE RECENT RAIL ROAD ACCIDENT. PHILADELPHIA, Sept. 11.--The jury who investigated the recent accident on the Camden and Amboy railroad attribute it to design on the part of the persons directly charged from the service of the company. The company offer a reward of \$10,000 for the arrest and conviction of the author of the outrage. Constables have gone to Morris-town to arrest the parties supposed to be implicated in the outrage.

FACTS ABOUT CAMPHINE, FLUIDS, &c. Mr. E. Meriam, of Brooklyn, has taken the trouble to keep a record of deaths, injuries, &c., reported in the New York papers to have been caused by the use of camphine, burning fluid, rosin oil, and similar preparations, during the year ending August 31st, 1853. From this record we learn that 10 persons were burned to death by camphine, &c., in New York, 4 in Brooklyn, and 5 in other places, while by the same cause 14 were badly injured in New York, 9 in Brooklyn, and 5 in other places. Several persons reported injured, were so severely burned that it is probable they died. In several cases, houses were set on fire by the explosion. Mr. Meriam proposes to collect all the records within his reach, bearing on this matter, with the view of submitting them to the next Legislature. The use of these explosive fluids is as dangerous as the use of gunpowder, and ought to be regulated by law.

CRIME IN MEXICO. The New Orleans Bee says that the Mexican newspapers "absolutely teem with accounts of the murders and robberies committed by the Indians in Conchula, Durango, and other States. These barbarians assault all the men they can find unarmed, steal the cattle, and carry off the women and children. In some instances they have beaten the troops sent against them, while in others they have been worsted, and forced to deliver up their captives and plunder."

Gen. Cass' Letter to the President. The writer which Gen. Cass is reported to have written to President Pierce is said to be most cordial. He assures him of his high personal and political regard, and declares no President ever had so many difficulties to encounter; that his course has been wise, judicious and patriotic; and that the writer will stand in opposition under the government, but as Senator the President can rely upon his earnest and hearty support of the administration. Secretary McClelland received a letter of like import.
