SYNOD OF NORTH CAROLINA.

The Synod of North Carolina met in the Presbyterian Church, in this place, on the evening of the 9th of November. In the absence of the Moderator, Mr. MEBANE, the Rev. Mr. MCPHERSON opened the Synod with a sermon. The Rev. II. McLEAN was elected Moderator, and the Rev. Messrs MCNEILL and CALDWELL, were appointed Clerks. Between fifty and sixty members were in attendance upon the session of the Synod. The dispatch, and the Synod adjourned at a late hour on Saturday night, to meet next year in the village of Concord, Cabarras County.

The most interesting item of business which came before the Synod, was the proposal made by the Synod of Virginia to endow a Fourth Professorship in Union Theological Seminary. This Seminary is under the joint control of the Synods of North Carolina and Virginia, and is located in Prince Edward county, Va., in the neighborhood of Hampden Sydney College. A delegation of Virginians, consisting of Rev. PETTON HARRISON and Rev. Drs. SAMPSON and DABNEY, Professors in the Seminary, appeared in Synod, and gave information concerning the views and feelings of the article on the subject which appears in their paper Virginia Presbyterians, touching this matter .-Earnest speeches were made by Rev. Mr. PENICE and Hon. A. W. VENABLE, and after considerable discussion it was agreed to proceed to the work of endowing said Professorship, and the whole matter referred to the Board of Directors of the Seminary.
