Without examining the legal sights which necrue to you us trustees under your charter of incorporation, and without determining by whom and in what way the thing should be done it suffices for me to state what the Bishop may lawfully decide and require, and to this the Congregation, either by mere consent or by direct and immediate action, should conform Consequently, I declare that those who refuse, fail in their duty, and, by thus hindering the Bishop in the free exercise of his holy ministry they become responsible for all the sad consequences that may result. Furthermore, I cannot believe that any law the discipline of your Church; on the contrary, I know that the spirit of justice which so strongly characterises the legislation of this country, will never make the accomplishment of its duties impossible to a religious congreconfusion.
