# ARRIVAL OF THE ARCTIC.

#### TWO DAYS LATER FROM EUROPE.

The War at the East-Contradictory Rumore-Integrity of Turkey Guaranteed by France and England-Trouble between a Spanish Official and Young Soule-Success of the Chinese Rebels.

NEW YORK, Dec. 11-The steamer Arctic has arrived, bringing 93 passengers, and Liverpool dates of Nov. 30th. Among her passengers is J. C. B. Davis, bearer of despatches from London and Paris. The Africa arrived out at midnight, on Sunday.

GENERAL INTELLIGENCE. Very little additional news of interest has been received. Nothing had occurred along the Danube, and heavy storms of rain and snow had set in. There were rumors of an armistice, but these were doubtful .---It was also reported that an engagement

had occurred between the Turks and Servians, but it was not credited. The conduct of Omar Pacha had been sanctioned by the government, and the

Sultan had presented him with a horse .-The allied fleets lie at Bey Cos. The Turkish fleet had gone into the Black sea to keep open the coast of Circassia. The Turks have five times repulsed the Russians from the fortress of San Nicholas .-Two Russian ships have been lost in the Black sea.

Admiral Sir L. Lyon was on his way to take command of the British fleet.

It is now reported that Dost Mahommed is hestile to Russia, as are all the Mahominedans of India.

Some difficulties had occurred between Turkey and Greece.

#### ENGLAND.

Parliament had been further prorogued till January 3d.

A treaty had been concluded between England and France, guaranteeing the integrity of Turkey, giving Austria and Prus-su the privilege of joining in it.

The papers mention vertising in Baltimore, and not a single case is the loss of the ship Liverpool, of New Bedford, and the Marcus, of Fair Haven, both whalers. The ship Corinthian, of New Bedford, had been injured in a squall.

## Later from the Cape of Good Hope.

Boston, Dec. 10th .-- By the barque Springbok, Capetown dates of October 25th have been received. The country continued quiet, only a few isolated murders occurring. The authorities were busily engaged in alotting the forfeited lands of the Kaffirs to the Dutch and English settlers A portion of the English troops at the Cape are to go to India.

Later advices from Muritius state that the sugar crop amounted to the unprecedented quantity of 90,000 tons.

The Island was rapidly increasing in population.

A copper mine had been discovered at the Cape.

#### FURTHER CALIFORNIA NEWS.

#### BY THE DANIEL WEBSTER AND EL DORADO.

More Fires- News from the Mines-A Prize Fight-An Earthquake-Great Discoveries of Gold on the Amazon-Expeditions we may, as all the aggregated energies of Filled Out by Peru and Ecuador-Shipping Intelligence- Wreck of Ships. &c.

NEW ORLEANS, Dec. 7 .- The steamers Daniel Webster, from San Juan de Nicaragua, and the El Dorado, from Aspinwall, have both reached their wharf in this city, bringing advices from San Francisco to Nov. 16th, two weeks later than previously received. (The number of passengers and the amount of gold by these steamers has already been telegraphed from the Balize.) By this arrival the Picayone has received full files of papers from all parts of California, Sandwich Islands, Oregon and South America, from which the annexed summary is selected :
