From the Boston Traveler. Another Attempt to Kidnap an Irish Girl sus-pected of Protestantism. Yesterday forenoon, the house of Richard Huntington, No. 15 Second street, Chelsea, in the absence of Mr. H., was visited by two Irish women, with the Crew Lists. avowed purpose of getting possession, dead or alive, of the person of a young hish girl, an orphan, who was living with Mrs. Huntington. Hrs. H. asked them if they had any legal authority for taking the girl away; they said no; but one was a sister and the other a cousin of the girl, and they thought they had a right to her. In reply to her inquires, what they intended to do with her, their only answer was, to Property. place her under Catholic influence. They were then told that the girl was at liberty to go with them if she chose; but that she should not be forced away contrary to her FiFa will. The girl declined going with her re-lations; whereupon one f them sprang upon her. and serving has by the hair of he total, Ingge they upon the floor, endeavoring . retuer out of the house. She succeeded at length in breaking away from them and reaching the door, when she called for help, whereupon the women abandoned their assault and fled from the house, protesting to those who were coming to Mrs. Huntington's rescue, that there was no trouble-no cause for alarm. Neverthe-

less, an officer was obtained, and one of the parties was arrested and bound over for trial; the other had not been found at last accounts. The explanation of this aggravated as-

sault is, as we understand it, simply this: some six months since, a young Irish girl, an orphan. between 13 and 14 years old, went to Mr. Huntington's as a domestic .---She appeared unusually intelligent for one in her situation, could read and seemed desirous of improving herself. She soon displayed an indifference towards the Romish worship and religion, and became a dilligent reader of the Bible. She neglected to attend the Catholic church, and declined, though repeatedly urged, and almost dragged to the Priest's house, to go to confession ; and finally, about a month since, attended, at her own desire, the worship of the Protestant Episcopal Church. 
