FURTHER FROM EUROPE. ARRIVAL OF THE CANADA AT BOSTON.

Interesting Debate in the British House of Lords on the Eastern Question and the Queen's Speech - Censure of the Government-Mail Steamers Reported Unfit f War-Smith O'Brien &c.

Boston, Feb. 18 - The steamship Canada arrived here at moon to-day, and her mails for the South will be despatched in the after-4000 train.

The following is the latest news: The Earl of Carnarvon, in moving the re-

ply to the Queen's speech, in the House of ords, and the Earl of l'ucle, in seconding it, merely echoed its sentiment. The Marquis of Blanciearde complained

that the speech gave no indication of the present position or the future intentions as to the war. In other countries, nominally less tree limited to their own immediate business; and all than England, information had been given to advertisements for the benefit of other persons, the people, but the British were kept in total ignorance by the government. Greater firmness on the part of England would long since have settled the Turkish difficulty. British want of energy had deceived the Czar into the war in which Europe would soon be plun-

The Earl of Clarend in defended the goversment. The Czar, during his long reign. had given proof that he desired peace .-The present position of the affair is, that no answer has come from St. Petersburg. Lord Malmesbury and Earl Gray also spoke, the latter remarking on the misman-

agement of the army all the Generals on the roll being unfit for service. The Earl of Derby noticed that the speech contained no allusion to any other foreign re-lations of Britain. President Pierce's Mes-

sage referred to important questions pending with Great Britain, but the Queen took no notice thereof. The Earl of Derby also reviewed at length the recent proceedings of the Government. The Earl of Aberdeen defended his delay

and unwillingness to engage in a foreign war and denied being either an Austrian or Russian tool. He evaded giving any further explanationat present, of the history of the Eastern difficulty. He defended Prince Alhert from the recent imputations, and Lord Hardinge did the same.

A debate ensued on the subject of the Peess having circulated those imputations. Several Lords indignantly denied having anything to do with the press.

On the 2d February Lord Lyndhurst, referring to papers before the House of Lords asked if it was true, as Ness-Irode had stated. that the draft of the Vienna note was submitted to the Czar for approval before it was coming leated to the Porte.
