New York has about seventy per. cent. more capital invested in live stock than either Ohio or Pennsylvania. If any one is curious to learn in what part of the United States may be found 500,000 acres of improved land in a body that yield the greatest value per acre, he will find them not close to any of the Atlantic cities from Boston to New Orleans, not in New England, Ohio, nor in any of the rich farming districts at the West or South, but in Western New York, and mainly in the valley of the Genesee. To make a farm produce its maximum in money, is itself a profound study. The farmers of Monroe county have this day over \$800,000 invested in farm implements and labor-saving machines. 
