The Mexican Government having, of he 5th of February, 1853, authorized the early construction of a plank and railroad across the Isthmus of Tehuntepec, and to secure the stable benefits of said transitway to the persons and merchandise of the cuizens of Mexico and the United States. it is stipulated that neither Government will interpose any obstacle to the Transit of persons and merchandise of both nations; and at no time shall higher charges be made on the transit of persons and property of citizens of the United States than may be made on the persons and property of other foreign nations; nor shall any interest in said transit-way, nor in the proceeds thereof, be transferred to any for-

ign Governments. The Umted States, by its agents, shall have the right to transport across the istli mus, in closed bags, the mails of the United States not intended for distribution along he line of communication; also, the effects of the United States Government and its citizens, which may be intended for transit, and not for distribution on the isthmus, free of custom-house or other charges by the Mexican Government. Neither passports nor letters of security will be required of persons crossing the isthmus and not remaining in the country.

When the construction of the railroad shall be completed the Mexican Government agrees to open a port of entry, in addition to the port of Vera Cruz, at or near the terminus of said road on the Gulf of Mexico.

The two Governments will enter into arrangements for the prompt transit of troops and munitions of the United States which that Government may have occasion to send from one part of its territory to another, lying on oppsite sides of the continent.

The Mexican Government having agreed to protect with its whole power the prosecution, preservation, and security of the work the United States may extend its protection, as it shall judge wise, to it when it may feel sanctioned and warranted by the public or international law.

ARTICLE IX. This treaty shall be ratified and the respretive ratifications shall be exchanged at the city of Washington, within the exact period of six months from the date of its signature, or sooner if possible.

In testimony whereof, we, the plenipotentiaries of the contracting parties, have hereunto affixed our hands and seals at Mexico, the thirtieth (30th) day of December, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and fifty-three, in the thirty-
