"One of these brutal murders which seem peculiarly to belong to the institution of Slavery, took place yesterday at the St. Nicholas Hotel. In the free States, men above the condition of rowdies do not habitually go armed like assassins; importations from the regions of chivalry, however, reveal occasional bowie knives, swordcanes, and pistols. In the present instance, a man claiming to be a gentleman, R. M. Graham, of New Orleans, had a murderous weapon-a sword-cane -and on being reprimanded for his drunken noise in the St. Nicholas Hotel, stabbed Mr. Loring of California, through the body, and killed him. This barbarous murder could hardly have been committed by a northern man. It is the product of Slavery; of that system thus described by Jefferson in his After on Virginia, when he says that, 'The whole commerce between master and slave " is a perpetual exercise of the most boiste-"rous; the most unremitting despotism on "the one part, and degrading submission "on the other. The man must be a pro-"digy who can retain his manners and "morals undeprayed by such circum-"stances."

The murderer was not a prodigy, neither his manners nor his morals were undepraved, and his boisterous passions resulted in the brutal murder, which has shocked this community.'

- The person who has been guilty of this great outrage is not, and never has been. so we are assured, a slaveholder. He was sent at the expense of his uncle, who owned the famous Harrodsburg Springs, from Kentucky to New Orleans. He married Miss Waterbury, daughter of a retired sea captain, living at New Bedford, and mece of Captain Marshall, of this city. The hand, and for sale very cheap, hy C. & D. DePRE, sons of this worthy nentleman established themselves in business in New Orleans; and we learn that the prisoner was always subjected to Northern social influences -The parties lived together. His wife was at the St. Nicholas with him. We learn also that the prisoner, owing to the violence which intoxication produces, has refrained from liquor on several occasions, and before his departure from New Orleans, had not alrank any for a year or more Here he drank, and became intoxicated and violent. Knowing, as he did, the effect of intoxication upon him, he is fully responsible for whatever act he committed in that state .-He was a wrong-doer from the beginning. and having provoked Col. Loring to do what was done, ought not to be allowed to avail himself of it to justify his killing Col. Loring. But it is not with the, enormities of the case that we have to remark, but with the improper use of the matter made by the Tribune.
