The 'glorious uncertainty' of the law is proverbial, a striking instance of which occurred the other day in the County Court of Marylebone, where an unfortunate tailor sought to recover the sum of £9 for clothes furnished to an ingenious customer. Taidors, more, perhaps, than any other tradesmen, are victims of knavery, at the mercy of accomplished sharpers, who ply their calling more effectually when they have a well made coat on their backs which has never been paid for.

In the case to which we refer, the unfortunate tailor imagined, no doubt, that he had 'grounds of action,' for he had executed the order and delivered the goods -Poor, misguided man! He knew nothing of the working of that ' glorious constitution under which he lives-nothing of the operation of those statutes, every one of which by a fiction of law, he is presumed to be acquainted with. When he had proved his case as he foolishly supposed, he was asked the kind of buttons which he had placed on the garments for the amount of which he sued. He answered without hesitation, 'cloth buttons,' The Judge eyed the defendant's lawyer with surprise.

Pray, what has such a question to do with the case?' 'Very much,' was the pert rejoinder, 'as I shall presently show?' and accordingly the learned gentleman, to the astonishment of every one-certainly to the astonishment of the unfortunate tailor, began to quo.e acts of William the Third, acts of Queen Anne and acts of George the First, giving in each case chapter and verse with the most cool and inblushing precision, proving that the makang of 'cloth buttons' was decidedly illegal, and that the unhappy plaintiff, so far om being in a position to recover his just had rendered himself liable to heavy penalties for making his buttons of cloth, when they ought to have been made of brass!

Inquisition in Spain, the author says. The great abuse which the Monks make of the Confessional, on all occasions when their own interests are concerned, is another powerful argument for their suppression.
