From the New York Herald. THE UNIVERSAL JUBILEE. Pope Pius the Ninth has proclaimed to the faithful throughout the world a three months' jubilee or general indulgence .-The Holy Father has been moved to this solemn act in consideration of the many and grievous afflictions under which the civilized world is at this moment suffering. Wars and earthquakes, and pestilence and famine, have been in all ages regarded as scourges with which the crimes of mankind have been punished; and prayer and sacrifice have been the only recognized panacea for these evils. The dissensions between potentates which have embroiled Europe in a sanguinary war, the pestilence which stalks abroad in city and hamlet, the earthquakes and other calamities which have gone to make the present year one of inusual destructiveness to human life, are all by him referred to that one great en-gendering cause—namely, the sins and rangeressions of the sons of men. And therefore it is that, in his encyolical letter given at St. Peter's, in Rome, on the 1st of August, he calls upon the hierarchy of the Church to incite, through their clergy, the faithful to join in supplication to the throne of grace, that the dissensions of Christian princes may be set at rest, that peace and tranquility may be accorded to the people, and that the arrows of divine wrath may

But all these calamities combined are in the eyes of his Holiness less intolerable than the heresies propagated on all sides. Indif-ferentism and infidelity appear to him to have far more terrors in their train than even war and pestilence. The latter are, at worst, mere temperary evils, of comparatively ephemeral existence; but the former, if permitted to take root and spread. may encompass the earth, and in connection with the spirit of revolt, may crush and trample upon the thrones of monarchs and the chair of apostles. And so to guard against such a dreadful contingency, the Pope calls for the exercise of the greatest zeal and the offering up of the most ferwent supplications to prevent the growth of shese dreaded demons of infidelity and se-

From the St. Louis Republican BATTLE AT SARPY'S POINT.

Defeat of the Troops from Fort Laramie—Go crament goods captured—Store villaged. Sampy's Point, Neshaska Territory, Eight Miles E. of Fort Labame, Aug. 21 1854. Sir: An affair has happened here be-tween the soldiers and the Indians which ought to be properly noticed by the United States Government. Having been an eyewitness to the battle, I consider it my duty to furnish a strict account of it and its

In the first place, on the 17th August, a train of Mormons passed this place. The Indians, who were encamped here waiting Indians, who were encamped here was for their payment from Government, no provisions, and were of course and for something to eat. As the More were passing a lame cow, belonging man in the rear of the Mormon train. came frightened and ran into the Indian camp. The Mormon left the cow behind, and so one of the Indians, a Minnecosha, shot it down, and with his companio it up. The Mormons then went to the Fort and reported that the Indians had

killed one of their cows.

On the 19th, about two o'clock in the afternoon, Lieut. Grattan, with a con of twenty-seven soldiers, and Auguste Lucien, interpreter, arrived here to arrest the Indian who had killed the cow. I accordingly sent for the chiefs to go with the lieutenant and make the arrest. They accompained him, but the Indian was not willing to give himself up, saying that he would die first. While the Bear Chief of the Wazazies was atanding, with three other chiefs, the Little Thunder, the Big Partisan, and the Man who is afraid of his Horses, among the soldiers, the lieutenant ordered his men to fire. General Agent Commission and Forwarding Mer. But one round was fired, when the Indians the soldiers and killing all of them with the exception of one private, who is not expected to recover. Lieut. Grattan and two of his men were killed while standing by their cannon, the lieutenant receiving twenty-four arrows, one of which passed through his head. As soon as the soldiers saw their commander fall they took to flight, but were all killed within half a mile of this place. The Ogalallah camp was about one mile distant, and a white map named Lefroy lott was staying there at the time. Being a Sioux interpeter, the chiefs requested him to stay between the camps to prevent the young men from charging on the soldiers, but he could succeed, and barely escaped with his life.

After the battle the Chiefs came in my house, and said that, as the young men had killed all the soldiers that had come to fight them, they would now go and slaugh-ter the rest of the soldiers at the fort, burn all the houses, and kill all the whites on the river. But I told the Chiefs to ston them from so doing, assuring them that since the soldiers had commenced the quarrel, it would be overlooked by Government. But they then rushed in the house, and demanded of me to give them every thing that they wated. To save our lives I gave them every thing that I had in my store, to the amount of two thousand dol lars. The next day they went to the post of the American Fur Company, took all the goods that were sent to them by Government, and pillaged the store. The situation of the traders and of Fort Laramie is perilous in the extreme. I was requested by the commander of the fort to bury the dead soldiers, since he had not men enough

to detach a party for that serv ce, and I succeeded in doing so. As far as I know any thing about In-dians, I think that our Government ought to send five hundred mounted mon, ve troops, to keep the Indians in au and one company of infantry to guard the fort. The Indians in the recent battle, after killing all the soldiers, broke their cannon to pieces and carried off their muskets and animals. As for placing the infantry on a prairie to fight with Indians, it is just the same as putting them up as targets to te shot at. There were about one thou-sand Indians in the battle. Yours, truly,

That affair was "evil" enough and "small" enough certain ly, and if the Secretary of State has mann ged to turn his own error to any good account he will prove himself very clever or very lucky, and we shall be willing to give him full credit for it, besides having our confidence strengthened in the philosophy of the poet. The story we allude to is found in the following letter of the intelligent Washington correspondent of the Journal of Commerce:

Washington, September 15.

I have reason to believe that the Central American question is about to be settled between the United States and Great Bribetween the United States and Great Britan in a manner mutually satisfactory.—
The Greytown affair has served the good purpose of expediting an adjustment. The principles of adjustment are agreed upon hers. As Mr. Crampton is a sky diplomatist, and was greatly annoyed at the exposure of the treaty which he made with Mr. Webster, (which exposure was the cause of its failure,) it is to be hoped that the particulars of the new project will not be prematurely divulged. Of course the British Government is yet to be consulted on the subject of the project. The interests of both Governments require a speady adjustment of the subject. Of course the arrangement will include an indemnity for the destruction of property of British subjects at Greytown. jects at Greytown.
