To another present, who was weep. ing, he said, "(), Deacon F -, pray God to have mercy on me. O, pray that God will forg ve me. O God-() Jesus, have mercy, have mercy!" Thus the night shadows fell upon the poor Luman and with a groun he entered the "dark valley" and set out to meet his God.

MISCELLANY. DELAWARE POLITICS. We learn from the Delaware Journal that at the election held throughout that State on the 3d instant the "American ticket" was elected generally, and that the "American majorny" in the whole State on that day was 996 Another and a general election will be held on the second Tuesday of November, at which, it is confidently believed, the defeat suffered by the Democrats on the 4th will be greatly increased. The ticke's in the field are "American" on one side and Democratic on sent in at different times and from different Po.t the other. No State EWhig" ticket will be run. The candidates of the Americans are: For Governor Peter F. Causey, and for Congress, E. D. Cullen. Those of the Democrats are: For Governor, William

Burton, and for Congress, George R. Riddle, the present Representative. The principles of the "American" party in Delaware are laid down in the resolution adopted at a meeting held at Dover on the 4th instant. They appear not to be proscriptive of any sect or religion. We observe that Mr. Clayton was attending a dying nephew in Philadelphia at the time. He is believed to concur in the main principles laid down at this meeting, but is understood not to be a "Know-Nothing."

The Legislature of PRINCE EDWARD ISLAND Was opened by Gor. DALY on the 26th ultimo. The principal topics mentioned are the ratification of the Reciprocity Treaty with the United States and the final withdrawal of the troops from the island. The former measure, he thinks, offers consiserable advantage to that island, and in order to secure them with the least possible delay a measure would be submitted for the Legislature. The detachment of the 6th regiment stationed at Sydney Care Breton, has been withdrawn, and it is said that the Imperial Government will

abandon that place as a military station. MORMONS IN KANSAS

The Alton Comier states that the momons contemplate forming a settlement in Kansas. A delegation from Alton, to be joined by others at St. Louis, making in all about 200 families, was preparing to start. The spot selected for settlement is in the interior, about 100 miles from the town of Kansas. The object is to form a stopping place for the poorer class of mormon emigrants, where they may rest and recruit, before proceeding to Salt Lake City.

OUTRAGEOUS INDIAN MURDER. A lady, from the nighborhood of Fort Ripley, now in St. Paul, brings information that the wife of Rev. Mr. Spencer, Missionary at Red Lake, was murdered a shore time since by a war party of Sloux Indians. Mrs. Spencer was sitting in her apartment after dark, when she was fired upon and killed instantly. She was an estimable lady, who had resided several years with her husband as a missionary among the Chippewas. Red Lake is entirely within the Chippewa country, and the munderers were no doubt a war party of Sioux, who were out inquest of Chipperwa scales.
