At the battle of Balaklava he again assisted the wounded. The boy did his duty by day and worked in the trenches by night, taking but little rest.

At the battle of Inkermann he was surrounded by Russians about twenty minutes, and to use his own words, he said he thought it was "a case" with him, but he escaped all right. He received one shot, which went through his coat and out at the leg of his trowsers, but Providence again preserved him unhurt. He helped with all the bravery of a man to get in the wounded, and rested not until the poor sufferers were made as comfortable as he could make them.
