The honest, hard working American mechanic and laborer, who would rather rot, than rob to get into the Penitentiary, just for the sake of being fed and lodged there—who would die rather than go to the Alms House—has to pay rumously high rent to his landlord, because his landlord is largely taxed to support the standing armies of stalwart mendicants, with which the bankrupt, corrupt, and dishonorable governments of the old world are con-

These foreigners not only govern, or assume to govern us, on our own soil,but they impose grievous contributions upon our exchequer-billet their beggars upon us-and to all intents and purposes, look upon us, and treat us precisely, as if the United States of America were but some petty province, with a people so used to impositions and insults, that resistance has sunk into submission, and remonstrance into acquies-cence. Let those timid souls, therefore, who quake and quiver at what they af-fect to think the too rapid and dangefect to think the too rapid and dangerous progress of "Americanism" throughout the land, take heart. Their fears, so far, are groundless. The foreigners, as yet, have the best of us, and are likely to keep the ascendancy, for a long while to come.

Not only are we, in a great part, ruled by the subjects of the Queen of Great Britain, but the King of Sardinia volunteers what he can, to govern us. To get these paupers off his hands, and compel us Americans to work to support them, we have been told that they were not beggars, but political exiles.

Knowing the generous sympathies the American people have ever entertained for exiles of that class,-for men who have from time to time been expatriated from their native land, perchance for a too often and evident attachment to liberal principles,-these unprincipled governments of continental Europe, presume to pawn off upon us the sick, the lame, the halt, the blind, and the idiotic even,-thinking we are disposed to put up with such shameful insults forever.

The Emperor Napoleon helps to rule, and helps to tax us, through the same channel of beggar immigration. So do the petty princes of most of the German States. And so does Switzerland .-Look, for example, at the record in this very day's paper, and say whether it is not time—high time—that something be done to resist this filthy flood of foreignism, which, under the special supervision of the despots of Europe,large and small, is rushing and rolling in upon us, threatening in time to sap and sweep away whatever of native sentiment, or native feeling, native principle, is still left uncontaminated among

Now, then, how long are we to put up with this state of things? How long are the petitions of the people to be laid on the table,-or contemptuously flung under it, -on the pretext that the Americans are engaged in a crusade against Foreigners? How long is the senseless cry of "Hindoo" to silence the righteous demands of a too uncomplaining and long suffering people? Are the "Foreigners" to have nothing? Is Europe to have a general jail delivery, at our expense, without granting us the poor privilege of a protest? Are we to have the hospitals and alms-houses of Italy, Germany and Switzerland, emptied at our doors, and, remonstrating, be told that the "Know Nothings" must be put down? If so, gentlemen of the Foreign Party, let us have an understanding at once,-and we are ready for the issue.

## MISCELLANY.

To visit the mosques and the Seraglio Palace a firman or permit must be had from the government and that is to be paid for roundly. An officer or two must attend with his sword and staff, and they must be feed well. Then at every mosque and other sa-ered place you visit there are servants to be feed, and if a party get through the day's exception for forty dollars they do very well. and prepared a residence that had no equal in the Eastern world. Armed sentinels admitted us by the great pavilion, which is cal-led the Parte-a gate-and from this the Ottoman Empire takes its name. Fifty men ston may religiously confide in his honor as a gen-tleman, and confidently rely upon his skill as a phy-at once in the midst of a vast courtyard, (the whole palace grounds are three miles in circuit,) and passing across it we were conducted into the palace. A flight of stairs brought us to the audience-chamber, a wide apartment, carpetted and sorrounded with a rich divan. The throne-room was furnished with chairs and solas, showing a conformity to Western customs.

Another and another chamber, and we entered the Sultan's bath-luxuriously fitted up, but without some of the contrivances for comfort which poorer people enjoy. A brass bar across a door we were passing told us, or at least the guides informed us, that this was the entrance to the harem. No profans opening near was now entered, hung on one side with engravings, chiefly of Napoleon's battles; and on the other side a row of windows looked out on the court. This is the hall in which the hundred and fifty wives of the Sultan are daily assembled for the amusement of their common lord. Here When the misguided and improdent votary of pleasure finds he has imbibed the seeds of his his favor; and it is said that he drops his handkerchief at the feet of the one who has been the most successful.

Through this hall we were led along to the private armory of the Sultan, and while admiring the pistols, swords, dirks, yataghans, cimeters, sabres, etc., of elegant workmanships, adorned with gold and precious stones, my attention was called to an adjoining apartment, the Sultan's bed chamber, pinizaries with bayoneted guns stood before the open door, and permitted me to look in, but not enter. It was reported among the company in the other room that gentlemen were not allowed to go in; and the ladies old. We could see the magnificent couch and its gold and crimson damask canopy, and skilfulness of ignorant pretenders, who, by the use the sumptuous furniture of the chamber, untimely grave, or else make the residue of life mis- that comes unwoodd to him who earns it with the sweat of his brow, and does not wear a crown.

In the gardens of the palace, and near the water's edge, are many beautiful but small cottages, which from time to time have been erected at the desire of one or another of the Sultan's favorite wives. Fitted up according to the taste of each fair inmate, we could see in the low windows that open on the walks that they were very elegant and very oriental. The Sultan has the range of them all, as cages in which his pet birds are confined. And then we gathered some flowers, for in the last of December the roses were in full bloom in the open air, and every thing was palace was the kitchen, and fires going as if an army were to be fed from the great ranges and furnaces on which the dinner was even now cooking. Some of the pastry was serv-

we did eat it in the kuchen. Von Hammer says that there are nine several kitchens, and that forty thousand oxen are yearly killed here and cooked, 200 sheep daily, 100 lambs or goats, and 850 lowls. But the Sultan does not reside in the Seraglio; he is at one of his many palaces along the Bosphorus, and the cooking now in process was merely for the retainers of the palace. His future residence will be in the marble palace on the Bosphorus.

A thousand horses stand in the royal stables, which we passed on our way out; and the harness and trappings, covered with jewelry, are displayed in a room over the stalls. It required an hour to look through the old armory, containing one of the rarest and richest collections of helmets, graces, breast plates in form of stars, guns of strange patterns, in use before locks were invented, impliments of war now obsolete, but terribly effective in their day, and very curious now. The stacks of arms all ready for use were fast diminishing by the daily demand for the war; and probably come of the poor fellows that came on the steamer with we were by this time equipped from this armory and marching to the field.

In a gallery was a collection of the famous swords of successive Sultans, from the splendid Damascus blade of Mohammed II. Here, too, are the keys of all the cities of Turkey, mounted with gold, and deposited in token of their lealty to the Porte. For days one might be amused and instructed among these extraordinary gatherings of ancient and modern times.—Prime's Travels in Europe and the East.
