These dispatches were opened by Commander Farragut, who took the responsibility of doing so as the senior officer on this station. In consequence of the contents of the dispatches, the United States sloop of war St. Mary's is to be, put to sea as soon as she can be got ready, under secret orders, for San Juan del Sud. -
