FRANKFORT, Ky., Jan. 6, 1855. DEAR Son:-You wish to know my opinion about the Know Nothings, and if there are any in our State. I have it from good authority that there are in Kentucky not less than 60,000; and by the time the next election comes on, there will be, at least, 100,000, composed as I believe, of the best and most patriotic citizens. I look upon it as purely an American movement -as the breaking forth of the great recuperative power of the patriotic American people in their own defence. If I am properly informed as to their intention, it is to do what should have been done years ago, but better late than never. And if they do not do it now, when it can be done quietly by the ballot-box, the time will come when, if done at all, it will be done through seas
