HORRIBLE ACCIDENT.

The Richmond *National American* of Saturday gives the following particulars of the distressing accident that occurred on the Central Road on the 21st inst., which resulted in the death of an old gentleman named Pittman.

The unfortunate occurrence took place five miles this side of Staunton. The mail train was returning to Richmond, the cars running at their usual speed, and in coming to a sharp curve on the road, the deceased was first observed sitting on the track.

The engineer saw him only when about 4 or 5 yards distant, and reversed the engine in order if possible to avoid the catastrophe. The deceased being dead did not hear its approach, and was caught by the cow-catcher and dragged some distance. His skull was fractured by the concussion, and he was found to be entirely dead when the engine was stopped. Mr. P. was probably eighty years of age. No blame can be attached to the Engineer for this untoward event, it being one of those unavoidable accidents, which occasionally occur on the best regulated railroads, as they sometimes do also in families.

THE DEPOSITION OF BISHOP DOANE'S SON.

It was stated that Bishop Doane, of New Jersey, had deposited his own son from the Episcopal ministry for joining the Roman Catholic Church. The following is the substance of the deposition.

'To all, everywhere, who are in communion with the one Holy Catholic and Apostolic Church: Be it known that George Hobart Doane, M. D., Deacon of the Diocese, having declared to me in writing his renunciation of the ministry, which he received at my hands from the Lord Jesus Christ, and his design not to officiate in future in any of the offices thereof, intending to submit himself to the schismatical Roman intrusion, is deposed from the ministry; and I hereby pronounce and declare him to be deposed, in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Ghost.'

The deposition is given at the Episcopal residence, Riverside, on the 15th of September, in the presence of Milo Mathew, D. D., and Marcus F. Hyde, A. M., Presbyters of the Protestant Episcopal Church. The Bishop adds--

'This sentence was not executed until the provision of the canon, "where the party has acted unduly and hastily," which has been offered, urged and refused. It only remains for me humbly to ask the prayers of the faithful in Christ Jesus that my erring child may be brought back to the way of truth and peace, and for myself, that I may have grace to bear and do the holy will of God.'

OLD BACHELORS.

Three old bachelors are, or were very recently, living in Prince George county, Maryland. They are brothers, by the name of Beale, the youngest of whom has reached the good old age of 'three score and ten.' They are all old bachelors, each cherishing for the female sex somewhat of the regards of Jonathan Oldbuck. A Boston correspondent of the Journal of Commerce writes--

We hear of a disturbance among the students of Dartmouth College. It is said to have occurred in this wise: Several Sophomores, not having the fear of the consequences before their eyes, painted the seats of the Freshmen's recitation room--

The freshmen retaliated by greasing the seats of the Sophs. The last now broke into a Freshman's room, and shaved off his hair close to his head. Of course, the mischievous Sophomores were called up before the College authorities, and at the latest accounts twenty of them were likely to be expelled. Such scenes were formerly common at Dartmouth and other colleges; but for a number of years they have been rare. The Paris Monitor publishes a notification from the Minister of the Interior, reminding the public that no individual can, for the purpose of private printing, have in his possession or employ, small presses, of whatever kind they may be, without a previous authorization from the Minister at Paris, or from the Prefects in the Departments.

Persons infringing this law will be liable to six months imprisonment, and 10,000 francs fine. Type foundries, stereotype foundries, and manufacturers of printing utensils, must keep a book, in which they are to enter the names and addresses of persons purchasing any of their articles, and they are from time to time to send a copy of such entries to the Minister or to the Prefect, in default of which they will be liable to a penalty of from 50 to 200 francs.

NEW GAME UPON TRAVELLERS.
