HORRIBLE ACCIDENT. resulted in the death of an old gentleman

Persons infringing this law will be liable to six months' imprisonment and 10,000 francs fine. Type foundries, stereotype founders, and manufacturers of presses of every kind, as well as dealers in printing utensils, must keep a book, in which they are to enter the names and addresses of persons purchasing any of their articles, and they are from time to time to send a copy of such entries to the Minister or to the Prefect, in default of which they will be liable to a penalty of from 50 to 200 francs.
