ANTIQUIFIES FROM NINEVEH. A correspondent of the Journal of Commerce writes from Beirut that a few

days previously aletter was received from an intelligent missionary in Mosul, who still loves America and her institutions, containing, besides other matters, the information that he had filled fifty boxes. with choice antiquities of Nineveh, which were to be mounted on the backs of camels and thus transported to Scanderoon, and thence be shipped to Beirut, from whence they can be easily and theaply forwarded to Boston either this sommer or in the autumn. The fifty boxes of antiquities are to be distributed among several New England colleges.

The massive gate of Nineveh and other monuments obtained by Mr. Place, the French Cousul, had all safely reached Bassora, the port on the Persian Gulf were put on board the rafts at Mosul was made a holyday by the inhabitants, and the whole city turned out to behold the sight and render any necessary assistance. A letter from Mosul states that the excavations at Korsabad and Nimround had been discontinued and will not be resumed. All the French and English scientific explorers had left the country.

The writer says that Dr. Duff of Calcutta, had spent a few days at Beirut. His health had received considerable benefit from his last winter's sojourn in the south of France, and still more from his stay under the hot skies of Syria.

The commerce of Beirut has been large beyond precedent the past season. Steamers and large vessels have always been in port for Constantinople, to be freighted with wheat and barley for the seat of war. Prices of provisions were high at Beirut, but fruits were abundant and low-half a dozen pounds of deli-cious grapes can be bought for two cents, and as many figs from the trees for three cents. Within a few years the potato has been cultivated in the island of Cyprus; they grow to a good size there, and are fair and sound. The price at present is but forty cents a bush-

The American missions in Syria are said to be in quite a prosperous condition. An excellent seminary has been established at 'Mount Lebanon, where young men of talents, particularly such as give evidence of piety, are instructed for the ministry. Several of the native students were spending the vacation at Beirut.





PROOF THAT THE MOON IS NOT INHABI-TED.

Dr. Scoresby, in an account that he has given of some recent observations made with the Earl of Rosse's telescope, says: -"With respect to the moon, eve-ry object on its surface of 100 feet was now distinctly to be seen; and he had other Mill work. no doubt, that, under very favorable circumstance, it would be so with objects 60 feet in height. On its surface were craters of extinct volcanoes, rocks and masses of stones almost innumerable. He had no doubt that if such a building as he was then in were upon the surface of the moon, it would be rendered distinctly visible by these instruments. But there were no signs of habitatious such as ours-no vestive of architecture remain to show that the moon is or ever was inhabited by a race of mortals similar to ourselves. It presented no appearance which could lead to the supposition that it contained anything like the green fields and lovely verdure of this beautiful world of ours. There was no water visible-not a sea or a river, or even the measure of a reservoir for supplying town or factory-all seemed desolate."


