FATAL RAILROAD ACCIDENT

About 11 o'clock on Sunday morning last, an accident occurred upon the Union Railroad track, at its junction with Fourth street, which resulted in the death of Mr. Timothy Wilds, of Grafton.

Mr. Wilds was driving up 4th street, with a two horse team. The horses had crossed the track, when the engine came along, and struck the wagon amidstships.

Mr. Wilds was thrown by the force of the concussion from 15 to 20 feet in the air. In descending, his head struck upon the forward part of the engine, near the lantern, and he fell from thence to the catcher.

A horrible fracture of the skull was produced by the concussion. Mr. Wilds died about 4 o'clock yesterday afternoon. He was about 40 years of age, and a man of irreproachable character.

MYSTERIOUS DEATH

We learn through a reliable source that Mr. Statterfield, a young man in the employ of the Marine stores, was found dead on Monday morning last. So far as we can learn the unfortunate occurrence took place in the neighborhood of Penn's Store, Patrick county.

His age was about 21 years; and he leaves relatives and friends to deplore the sudden and melancholy loss of a dutiful son and brother.
