

From the Newbern Journal March 26. BEAUFORT HARBOR.

We are indebted to J. D. Whitford, Esq. President of the Atlantic & N. C. R. R company, for the following copy of a letcitities of Beaufort Harbour. We ask for property belonging to their own countrythe letter an attentive persual : BARQUE MELDON, BRAUFORT HARBOR,)

March 18th, 1856, DEAR SIR :

In answer to your note of this date making enquiries about the dimensions of this vessel, and requesting my opinion relative to the facilities of the harbor for ships of heavy tonnage, I have to inform you, that the Barque Meldon measures-length of keel 110 feet, breadth of beam 27 feet. depth of hole 17 feet, draft of water now with 550 tons rails on board, 16 1-2 feet.

With regard to the harbor, it is easy of access and affords shelter from all winds and the bottom is excellent for anchoring. In any ordinary time sailing vessels could enter the harbor drawing 18 feet; with the assistance of steam tugs, Vessels might cross the bar drawing 19 feet with perfect safety. .

It gives me pleasure to say as this is my first visit to the coast of North Carolina, that the representation abroad about Beaufort Harbor, does it great injustice, and I was most agreeably disappointed. The bar and harbor are unexceptionable-the Pilots on the coast are polite & competent and obtained without difficulty. I shall return to England and endeavour to get another cargo of Mr. Stanly's rails, for I acts passed by the General Assembly to know of no place I would sooner sail from, provide more effectually for the protection than the Port of Beaufort. of the slave interests of the State. 
