LATE FOREIGN NEWS.

New York, April 13.—The steamship Washington, from Bremen via Southamp-7 o'clock this morning Her dates from Liverpool are to the 24th, and from London to the 25th. The Gunard steamship America, from Boston and Halifax, had not arrived out.

The Treaty of Peace was yet unsigned. The Conference was less harmonious, owing to a demand put forth by the Prussian plenipotentiaries to be admitted to sign the treaty on the same footing and in the same character as if Prussia had been a party to the alliance throughout. It is said that Russia supports the pretensions of Prussia. This took place at the meeting of the 22d Another meeting was held on the 24th, but nothing had transpired of what then took place. The opinion prevailed that the Conference would ultimately resolve itself into an European Congress.

Peace is generally regarded as certain. The correspondent of the Times in the Crimea says that the war party there still cherish the hope that the peace negotiations may break down. It may suit the French (he says) to make concessions, but it ought not to suit the English. The French doubtless consider that they have done enough for honor, glory, and to revenge their reverses of 1812, and they cannot afford to carry on the war as England can. But their army, however numerous on paper, is dwindling sadly. The scurvy and fever are playing havoc in its ranks. The mortality is stated to be one hundred and twenty per day, and frequently more. The Allies had commenced the demolition of the enclosure lines around Sebastopol.

The Copenhagen correspondent of the missary had submitted to the Copenhagen demnity which Denmark claimed. The writer states further that the United States having declined to take part in that conference, the question would in all probability be resolved without their co-opera-

For this he proposes to give only the two hundred acres or so next the Potomac which include the house and tomb of Washington, (and which, had they not been Washington's, would not fetch \$20,000.) He will only sell with the understanding that the place is to be kept as it should be, (not as it has been,) as a patriotic memorial of the illus-

trious dead. I hear that Mr. Washington derives quite an income from Mount Vernon, notwithstanding its sterility. He received \$1,500 25 BAGS prime Rio Coffee, last year of the steamboat which plies between this city and Mt. Vernon for the privilege of landing passengers at the latter, and he has just sold timber off the place to the amount of \$12,000, to be manufactured into Mount Vernon canes, snuff boxes, &c. I believe this trade is yet in its infancy, and is expected to expand. Mr. Washington is some 35 to 40 years old, is married and has five children—the youngest (an infant) is a son, and the only male child born in the Washington mansion since it became
