COMMERCIAL PROSPERITY OF NEW OR-LEANS.

The city of New Orleans, commercially, appears to be growing very rapidly. The domestic ex-ports to foreign and coastwise ports, for the fiscal year just closed, amounted to \$110,353,436, which is an increase over the year ending the 30th June. 1855, of twenty-six millions six hundred and eighty-five hundred and ten dollars. The increase in exports to foreign countries for the year reaches the extraordinary sum of \$24,859,411, or with in a few hundred dollars of twenty-five millions of dollars, and an increase over the great year of 1853 of \$12,749,889. The domestic exports from New Orleans exceed those of New York for the same period of time. They are given as follows -New Orleans, \$80,547,963; New York, \$75,026, 244, or over five millions greater from New Or leans than from New York. This does not lool like New Orleans losing her commercial prosperity in consequence of railroads over the South and West diverting trade to other Atlantic ports.
