FURTHER FROM KANSAS. tack on Franklin by the Free State Men-De perate Conflict-Many Killed and

Sr. Louis, August 19 .- Advices from Kansas to the St. Louis Democrat explain the attack of the free State men in the town of Franklin, as follows:-Parties of Carolin ans and Missourians, encamped on Washington creek, having committed various depredations, the Lawrence people sent Mr. Hoyt, a Massachusetts man, to proceed to the Missourians' camp a diagree certain the reason of such depredation.

Hoyt went unarmed and was taken prisoner and shot dead. The Lawrence men immediately proceeded to attack Franklin and drive the invaders from the Torritory, but in consequence of their loss in killed and wanded they returned unsuccessful.

Farther advices state that the party of southerners which left have translated they returned unsuccessful.

southerners which left here two days ago for Kansas were attacked between Kansas city and Lecompton by a party of freesoilers, when a desperate conflict ensued, in which many were killed and wounded on both sides. The southerners retreate? August 21 .- The Leavenworth Journal of the 17th states that 300 Freesoilers, headed by Mr. Brown. drove a colony of Georgians near Ossawattamie into the Missouri, destroying their property. On the 15th the Treadwell settlement was attacked by 400 Freesoilers. The settlers

sent to Governor Shannon for aid The governor called upon the troops to go to their aid and they refused. A fight occurred on the 14th near Ossawattamie between 200 Freesoilers and twelve pro-slavery men, who were in a fortified position. Twenty Freesoilers were

killed and wounded. On the 16th Lecompton was attacked and taken by eight hundred of General Lane's men. The United States troops having charge of Governor Robinson, M. Brown, and other prisoners, surrendered tor of the Southern Advocate, and another person, were killed.

It was reported that large bodies were organizing in Missouri; also, that the proslavery men intended to burn the town of Lawrence on the 10th.
