ARRIVAL OF THE GEO. LAW.

LATER FROM CALIFORNIA THE VIGILANCE COMMITTEE RE-

TIRED.

POLITICAL MOVEMENTS, &c.

New York, Sept. 14th .- The steamer George Law arrived this evening, bringing tanils from San Francisco to the 20th of August. She connected with the steamer Jno. L. Stephens, which brought to Panama nearly \$2,000,000 of specie, and up-wards of 500 passengers.

The George Law left Aspinwall on the 3d instant, and arrived off Havana on the 8th. She sent a boat into port to ask leave to land her mails for New Orleans, which was refused. She then sailed for Key West and landed her mails-the steamer for New Orleans would call there and re-

The George Law brings no later intelligence from Nicaragua.

The George Law brings \$1,600,000 in gold en freight-of which \$312,000 is consigned to Drexel & Co, \$350,000 to Drexel & Co., \$90,000 to Duncan, Sherman & Co. \$18,000 to Wines & Co., \$15,000 to Watson & Sons, and various amounts to thirty others.

When the colt gets to be three weeks old, or as soon as it is perfectly straightened in its limbs. measure from the edge of the hair on the hoofs to the middle of the first joint, and for every inch it will grow to the height of a hand of four inches, when its growth is matured. Thus, if this distance be found sixteen inches, it will make a horse sixteen hands high. By this means, a man may know something of what sort of a horse, with proper care, he is to expect from his colt Three years ago I bought two very shabby looking colts for \$20 each, and sold them recently for \$200.
