Professor Smith and Dr. Clendenin were promptly summoned to the aid of the injured parties, who were immediately conveyed to the residence of Col. Turner, and upon an examination of their wounds they found them to be of a nature threatening a speedy fatal termination, from hemorhages which ensued. Throughout the whole day the vicinity of Col. Turner's residence was thronged with his numerous friends, though they were both so low that but few were allowed admission to their rooms.

Deputy States' Attorney Pinkney proceeded there in the afternoon to take their depositions, but they were in such a condition as to preclude that being done. At a late hour last night the physicians in attendance pronounced both of them hopeless; they have sank so fast during the day as to render their surviving throughout the night as exceedingly improbable.

FIRE. BALTIMORE, Sept. 25. Yesterday morning, about a quarter past one o'clock, a fire was discovered in a frame stable situated on Fitzpatrick's court, rear of the old Charles street city spring lot, which speedily enveloped the tenement in flames, and communicated to a row of four small dwellings, all of which were considerably damaged. The watch promptly sounded the alarm, and several companies were quick in their operations, pouring their well-directed streams upon the roofs and upper stories, otherwise a most destructive conflagration must have ensued. The stable contained four valuable horses and a quantity of barness and feed, which were destroyed, not withstanding every possible exertion was made in order to rescue them from the flames. The horses and stable belonged to Mrs. George B. Clark, of Baltimore county. They were formerdy insured in the Associated Firemen's office, but the policy expired on the 17th of June last, since which time the owner had deferred a renewal of the policy. The first house was occupied by William Poole, whose furniture, whilst being hastily re-enoved, was considerably broken; he is uninsured. The next house was uncccupied. The third was in the occupancy of Mr. Michael Free, and the fourth by Mr. James
Ryan, whose loss also consists in breakage
of furniture. Neither of these parties were
