IMMENSE DEMOCRATIC MEETING IN NEW

The largest Democratic meeting ever held in New York City came off on Wednesday night week. Over twelve hundred merchants and leading men of the City joined in the call for it, and it is estimated that from fifty to seventy-five thousand persons were out on the occasion -The Democracy, the bone and sinew, were there by acres. The following resolutions were adopted: "Resolved, That the thirty-five electoral votes of the Empire State of right belong to, and ought to be, and must be cast for the candidates of the National Democratic party for President and Vice President of the United States, James Buchanan and John C. Breckinridge; and that we heartily congratulate the Democracy upon that perfect union in our ranks and entire con solidation of our organization, which enable us to look forward with confidence to such a result, thereby insuring the success of our noble cause, the ascendency of Democratic principles, and the undisturbed en-

joyment and perpetuation of all the rights

of all the States, and of all their citizens Resolved, That the River and Ocean Counties of the State of New York, ever deeply imbued with patriotic sentiments, and embracing the soil consecrated by the blood freely shed by our fathers in the Revolutionary struggle, are sincerely attached to the Constitution and to the Union of the States; that in the great national crisis through which we are passing, new proofs of their fidelity to the great principle of Nationality shall not be wanting; and that we pledge to our brethren of the interior a clear majority for the Democratic State and Electoral tickets, up to the boundaries of the tidewater counties, and invite them to meet us there with a
