Some ten days ago, of Mornington, two females went out in the evening in search of their cows, and, not returning that night, search was made in the morning, when, sad to relate, their skeletons were only to be found, their flesh having been completely devoured by the wolves. We are yet unable to record the

particulars, the sad outlines only having as yet reached us. Our informant also states that a man in that locality has been ble fate as the unfortunate women.

"The wolves were never before known to be so numerous or so ravenous as they are this season in this section of the country. It is regarded as unsafe to be alone on the public highways after dark. Reports are reaching us almost every week of some of their ravages through the coun try. Almost every body has been visited by them and mischief done to a greater or less extent.

"A farmer in North Easthope had thirty sheep killed in one single night by them. A few nights previous they killed twelve belonging to the same man.




