ARRIVAL OF THE ATLANTIC.

FOUR DAYS LATER FROM EUROPE. New York, October 28.—The Collins steamer Atlantic, from Liverpool, with dates to the 15th inst. arrived here at 8 o'clock this evening.

The steamer Asia arrived out at 8 o'clock on the morning of the 13th.

GENERAL NEWS. The news by this arrival is interesting from Madrid it is telegraphed under date of the 12th that O'Donnell has fallen and Narvaez has been restored.

The Paris Journal Debats says: "We believe that the pretensions raised by Russia to the Island of Serpents have been abandoned, and the Island has again become the possession of Turkey.

Russia is said to have given formal notice to reassemble the Congress of Paris, to which France and Prussia have assented, and the matter now awaits England's concurrence.

Denmark has consented to a reduction of land transit duties, preparatory to a reduction of the Sound Duties.

The weather has been variable. New York, October 28, P. M.—The Atlantic left Liverpool at noon on Wednesday, the 15th. On the 23d she saw the steamer Arago, and on the 27th the steamer Ericsson.

Letters from Paris on the subject of the financial crisis are less unfavorable. The billon in the Bank was said to be increasing both at Paris and the Branches.

A camp of fifty thousand men would be established soon at Chalais sur Marine.

Prince Mehmet Ali Pasha, of Egypt, has arrived at Paris.

It was rumored that the Rothschilds had contracted with the Bank of France to supply gold to the amount of six millions four hundred thousand pounds sterling.

Revolutionary documents addressed to the Italian people, purporting to be signed by a committee for the people and the students at Paris, were secretly posted in various quarters of Paris.

ARRIVAL OF THE ILLINOIS. TWO WEEKS LATER FROM CALIFORNIA. New York, Oct. 28.—The steamer Illinois arrived here this afternoon from Aspinwall, bringing four hundred passengers and San Francisco dates to the 6th. Also, \$1,682,000 in specie.

The principal consignees are as follows: Wells, Fargo & Co. \$200,000; Drexel & Co. \$225,000; Metropolitan Bank \$200,000; Howland & Aspinwall \$133,000; Was Hoge, \$118,000; Duncan, Sherman & Co. \$110,000; Thomas Watson \$28,000; S. H. Wines \$16,000.

Business at San Francisco was improving, and the intelligence from the mines was encouraging.

Ex-Governor McDougall was arrested on his arrival out on a charge of illegal voting.

The Illinois connected with the steamer Golden Gate, which brought down \$2,153,000 in specie.

The jury in the case of ex-Collector Hammond, on trial on the charge of embezzling public moneys, had disagreed.

The grand jury for San Mateo county had found an indictment against Ex-Governor McDougall for fraud at the May election, and he was held to bail in the sum of \$500.

Doctor Armstrong was murdered near Sacramento, by a man named Colebrook, and while the latter was being examined, the citizens broke into the court, disarmed the officers, seized the prisoner and carrying him off, hung him upon a tree.

The suit of Meisick versus Sunderland has been decided in the Supreme Court in favor of the plaintiff, giving him a title to one third of the city of Sacramento, worth three millions of dollars.

The San Francisco papers publish a letter from Col. Fremont, in answer to a letter of enquiry addressed by the editor of the San Francisco Bulletin to the three Presidential candidates.

The Bulletin says that Col. Fremont's letter has given great satisfaction to the citizens generally.

Advices from Oregon state that the prospect of peace with the Indians was flattering.

Capt. Bonman, of the United States army, who had become insane, wandered from his friends and his dead body was afterwards found in the woods.

There is nothing important from Washington Territory.

The sloop of war John Adams has arrived at Honolulu—all well.

There is nothing of importance from the Islands. Lieut. Charles W. Abey, of the frigate Saratoga, died at Aspinwall on the 17th inst.
